On Sunday 28th February three Karatekas from the local Dunolly Karate Dojo competed at the Australia Karate Federation Victoria State Championships.

And what a great weekend of Karate it was!

Local karate instructor, Troy Hoban came second. It's the fourth year in a row that Troy has medalled. In 2018 and 2019 Troy came first, making him State Champion two years in a row, but in 2020 a new competitor, Anthony Yam entered his age division, (35+ years) bumping Troy down to second runner-up.

Anthony is an amazing Karate athlete, still winning in the Men's open —Troy felt honoured to have the opportunity to compete against him. Upon entering the 2021 State Championships Troy joked "I bet I'm up against Yam again." And sure enough, Troy won his first round against another competitor, and was against Anthony in the medal match, coming second place to Anthony again.

This year Troy was able to win a flag against the tough

In 2020 at the State Championships both Leah and Tyson were sitting in the Top 10, and despite not being able to train as much in 2020 due to COVID restrictions, we are extremely proud of their efforts at the 2021 round of State Championships. Both Tyson and Leah came 4th in their division. Meanwhile Alicia from our NSW karate school came second in the Veteran 45+ Kata and first in Kumite at the NSW All Styles Championships.

Another massive achievement here at Kokoro Kai Karate to mention is that Shihan Peter is now Kaicho after being presented his 6th Dan certificate at the Victorian State Championships.

Great achievements, and just the beginning of what is going to be a great year of karate here in Dunolly.

A mulcher, a chipper, a shredder? Who knows the correct name for this garden tool? But there I was this week, looking sadly at my old friend. For many years we have worked happily together, a great partnership. Me feeding it garden prunings, it shooting out suitably small mulch. Sometimes it would burp, grunt, and stop, that is true. Then I would have to tip it upside down, which made me grunt and almost stop, and pull out the tangled mess of foliage which was always the heart of the problem. Once cleaned off it would go again, munching happily.

The mulch that has spilled from its maw over the years has been systematically spread around the garden. It has helped the garden not only survive drought, but to actually thrive. Once my older grandson got to an age where he could help, there was no end to the mulch being spread around the yard.

Melaleucas are always up for a prune, as are the cotoneaster and emu bushes. Salvias like a good cut back too. Grevilleas also like a decent trim. Though I have become a bit wary of them since I came out in allergic eczema last year and was told that while many things in your garden can cause it, grevilleas are a prime suspect. So for the last 10 years or so, my mulcher and I (and Tom) have toiled away, happily making wheelbarrow after wheelbarrow of good mulch. The soil has improved greatly as a result and I have been able to plant shrubs in hard clay soil and they have grown. So as I watched Tom pull it apart and clean it out thoroughly last week, I was confident it would go again. When it was all safely back together, tipped up the right way and plugged in, it was

turned on. It was time to face the truth. My trusted old friend was no more. Such a sad moment. Of course I had noticed it becoming more battered and slower over the years; that happens to everything, but I had thought it would go on forever.

# **Salted Caramel Popcorn**

# Ingredients

- 4 cups popcorn, cooked
- ¾ cup brown sugar
- 125g butter
- 2tbs honey
- pinch of salt



### Method

Cook popcorn according to the packet instructions and place into a large bowl. Melt the brown sugar, butter, honey and salt in a saucepan over a low heat until the sugar has dissolved. Simmer, uncovered, for 4-5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Pour the caramel sauce over the popcorn and use a spoon to stir it through until all of the popcorn is completely covered. Spoon the mixture into one even layer onto a baking paper lined tray. Set aside to cool completely. Once completely cooled, break the popcorn into pieces and store in an airtight container. Enjoy.

# Spotlight on Jan Stephenson

Jan Stephenson is a pretty familiar name around here, mainly for the pleasure he has brought to so many of us through his music. Jan has livened up Dunolly with the many musical events at the local Golf Club and other venues on a regular basis. Apart from this public image, Jan has had a most interesting and intriguing family background.

Jan's mother and grandmother arrived in Fremantle from England in 1952, Jan's father to follow later. Patricia, Jan's mother, was heavily pregnant with him and there was every chance Jan could have been born on board the ship; however, his mother just made it to the Subiaco Hospital. Otherwise he would have had an interesting passport; born at sea.

Both Jan's mother and grandmother, Ethelreda, were show dancers and found few outlets in WA so moved to Victoria and settled in St. Kilda. Patricia did the rounds of the theatres and finished up dancing in most of the big Melbourne theatres, Her Majesty's, The Comedy, The Palais and finally her big moment came when she was engaged as one of the famous Tivoli girls, renowned in Melbourne as the top variety theatre. She danced under the stage name of Patricia Fernandez. Those of you who are old enough would remember the Tivoli Theatre in Bourke Street. I was once taken there by my father as a small girl, much to my mother's protests.

Jan's grandmother had a very interesting dancing background back in England where she worked with people like Charlie Chaplin, W.C. Fields and Stan Laurel, among others.

When Trish was small, Ethelreda had to smuggle her into the dressing room hidden in a costume basket, because being unmarried, she had to keep her hidden. At that time she danced with Catherine Dunham, a very famous dancer of the period.

Jan remembers watching his mother dance from a young age and she performed well into her 50s. Once she reached 60, Trish was still very active and became a wardrobe mistress and dresser, doing all the repairs and alterations to the costumes. In this role she met all the visiting celebrities including Margot Fonteyn, Rudolf Nureyev, Miriam Carlin and Shirley Bassey. Jan remembers once having a vodka with Nureyev at an after party. Trish lived till her late 80s and stayed in touch with most of the celebrities with whom she had worked.

When Jan was 10 his father bought his mother a guitar and Jan picked it up to see how it worked. In no time he

was working out chords and tunes, so when he was 12 he was signed up with a classical music teacher. He studied music for five years. After school, Jan obtained an apprenticeship as a fitter and turner and at night worked in a theatre as a stagehand. He stuck at that, working around the clock, saving up to buy motorbike; and believe it or not, his amazing mother was already riding a motor bike to work when she became sick of tram travel. Jan wanted to follow in Mum's footsteps, but sadly never became a dancer; but he did get that bike.

When he was 18, Jan had some friends who were putting together a band and they invited him to sit in. Then he was asked to join the band, *Main Line*, his first public venture into the music world. They were a blues band who played in many well-known Melbourne music venues. We remember when Jan played with *Oozin' Blues* and later formed his present group — *Groove Dudes*.

Dunolly is fortunate to have such local talent with music and drama. You never know what you will find if you dig deep into people's past lives. Jan said his mother had two mottos he always remembers — "Go with the flow" and "Fake it till you make it."

### CENTRAL GOLDFIELDS RATEPAYERS AND RESIDENTS ASSOC. INC.

The Community Engagement Policy was tabled at the February 23rd ordinary council meeting. This was a vast improvement on the draft, and we were very pleased to see it tabled and passed document. A well-done vote to the Council, and also to all those who participated in the drafting from the community and the Shire.

Now CGR&RAI would like to see this complimented with a strong demonstration of incorporation of this policy within the council.

On Monday 1st March the council organised a very rushed community presentation of an update for the Carisbrook Levee. We believe this event was organised just so the council could state they had community consultation. This was initially a very welcomed presentation, but after could not be called a community consultation. The 18 residents were asked to submit two questions each to give council an idea as to what areas needed to be addressed, but were not individually answered at the meeting, which appears to be less than satisfactory. At the presentation several attendees were invited to ask questions. Most didn't get to complete their questions, and a reply was factored to address some of what was asked. Most residents left the event with more concerns than answers. We ask the councillors meet with the Carisbrook locals, discuss, communicate and come to an understanding.

On Tuesday 2nd March, it was reported to us that at the Council's workshop, the levee was raised and there was general discussion with Shire and the councillors. The reported outcome was stay with the Entura plan, and the councillors were pleased with the outcome of the Monday public event. If this is the councillors' and Shire's demonstration of the new Community Engagement Policy, it's going to be a long four years.

Now with an understanding of the councillors' and Shire direction, the CGR&RAI would recommend all residents throughout the Shire who live in areas where flood works have been carried out over the past eight years, or in an area which could be affected by a flood event, to document and register (send a copy to the Shire) the present concerns you have with your area. If possible, include photographs going back to the 2011 or 2010 flood event. Should any worse effects occur to your property due to the works, you possibly would have a claim, but please do yourselves a favour and have it all well-documented.

Our CGR&RAI monthly meeting was held at Carisbrook on Tuesday 2nd March. About 20 attended the Carisbrook levee presentation, and 18 attended the meeting after that. Councillor Wayne Sproull attended both meetings and was very well received. Thank you. At our meeting we addressed the airport, Men's Shed, Carisbrook levee, industrial development and a few other issues. One issue raised regarding industrial development was the fact that there are two large industrial lots at the Tullaroop Road industrial area. One is approximately 2.1 acres and the other approximately 1.7 acres which council owns. Neither blocks of land are for sale, so this raised a question as to why for over 10 years our council has been advocating for industry and support growth, yet our industrial and tourism development seems to be stalled. Hopefully with our new councillors there will be a renewed effort to get industry and tourism back on the improve.

Fantastic to see the Visitor Information Centre returned to its old location, Maryborough Railway Station. CGR&RAI hopes our Shire and community understand the position of this Centre does not create tourism; it's the people and the support from the Shire which does. So for our Shire to grow, we need community input and support from across the Shire.

Our next monthly meeting (COVID permitting) will be at Dunolly, on 6th April 2021 at 7pm. Location to be confirmed. Thank you and stay safe. Wayne McKail President

This means for every \$2 provided by Council, the successful applicants must contribute a minimum of \$1 towards the cost of the project. 





# The misogyny of iron deficiency

A new article has highlighted the need to improve diagnosis and treatment of one of the most common conditions affecting women worldwide — iron deficiency.

"The misogyny of iron deficiency", published today in *Anaesthesia* to coincide with International Women's Day, was written by researchers from The University of Western Australia and University College London and addresses the history of iron deficiency anaemia and how women's health has often been overlooked.

Team lead Professor Toby Richards, Lawrence-Brown Chair in Vascular Surgery at UWA, is calling for greater recognition and equality for women's health.

Professor Richards said statistics showed one in three women would need to take iron supplements at some point in their life.

"Our figures show that up to 18 percent of women who appear fit and healthy are actually deficient in iron, with heavy menstrual bleeding the most common cause," Professor Richards said.

"Symptoms reported by women range from fatigue to brain fog, hair loss and eating ice."

Professor Richards said iron deficiency was a particular problem for women involved in fitness or sport with up to one in five athletes affected.

"Issues with a women's menstrual cycle and particularly heavy periods are surprisingly common and often not recognised with more than half also suffering iron deficiency.

"It's so common it's hiding in plain sight and both are under-diagnosed issues in women's health. Unfortunately, there has been a dogma to accept these as 'in the normal range' for women."

Professor Richards' team also recently surveyed two groups of women, including 68 triathletes and 181 students, at UWA's recent Orientation Day.

The women completed a simple questionnaire about previous iron status, menstrual blood loss, diet and motherhood. They were then tested for anaemia. Of the 181 women tested 14.5 percent, or one in seven women were anaemic and most were unaware.

"This is alarming that so many apparently fit and healthy women are actually anaemic, which may impact on their physical and mental health," Professor Richards said.

He said many women simply coped with constant tiredness among a host of other symptoms, without addressing the root cause.

"We want to raise awareness of these conditions and help women recognise the signs and symptoms, in order to get the treatment that their body needs to improve their health and welfare."

# Home-made natural air freshener

Going along with the theme of natural elements are best used in our homes, I thought as the days become cooler and we don't have our windows and doors open quite so often, a natural air freshener would be a good idea. They are super easy to make, with just a few ingredients. You can decorate your jars, or not, it's up to you.

- 2 cups distilled water, or just use water without chemicals
- 28 grams unflavoured gelatine
- 1-2 tablespoons fragrance or essential oil
- 2 tablespoons salt, the salt acts as a preservative
- 2-3 smaller glass jars
- Silk flowers, leaves or other additions you think would be fun.

Wash your glass jars out, dry them and position your silk flowers or other "decorative items" in the jars the way you would like them. Remember that this step is totally optional. If you just want the gel only, don't put anything else in the jars. You could always just add some food colouring to the gel if you'd like it to match a certain room, etc. Don't be afraid to be creative.

In a saucepan heat  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cups of the distilled water with the salt and stir until salt is dissolved, then add gelatine and stir until dissolved. Remove pan from the heat and add the remaining  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of distilled water and stir. Lastly, gently pour the fragrance oil in. Stir again until well mixed, and then start adding the liquid to the jars. I made sure to pick something with a wonderful autumnal scent.

Here's where you'll need to be patient. Put the jars in a safe place and allow them to cool overnight for the gel to form properly. The next day your air fresheners will be ready to use. As the gel evaporates it will release its scent. These are so much fun to decorate for different rooms in the house or to give as gifts to friends and family.



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# Notes from Loddon Shire

### **Calling all Loddon Shire artists**

Local artists, makers, creators and local businesses who operate or live in the Loddon Shire are encouraged to be part of an arts trail this coming spring.

To be held on 23rd and 24th October, the Loddon Valley Arts Trail will be created by artists for artists and is open to both professional and amateur artists.

The arts trail is a joint project between Arts of Olde in Bridgewater on Loddon and Loddon Shire Council.

Bridgewater on Loddon artist Ainsley McPherson, who owns the Arts of Olde art gallery and gift shop, said the idea for the arts trail initially came via Bendigo.

"Bendigo was having an arts trail, and a couple of us here in the Loddon Shire enquired as to whether we could be part of that trail," Mrs McPherson explained.

"Unfortunately, because we didn't live in the City of Greater Bendigo, we were unable to take part in the arts trail. So we thought — 'why not do our own arts trail? There are plenty of artists around here'.

"We put the idea to Council's tourism staff Robyn Vella and Shelby Hutchinson, and they said 'why not?'

"The arts trail is also a way of encouraging tourists to our Loddon Shire that are into art."

Mrs McPherson said there had already been plenty of interest in the arts trail.

"There seems to be quite a lot of interest so far. I can think of eight people to start with and that's just people I know," she said.

"However, as I've only been here for two and a half years, there would be a lot more artists around than just those I know. I think there's a lot of artists around — they can be hard to find," Mrs McPherson added.

"But we're encouraging these artists to come forward and be part of the Loddon Valley Arts Trail and showcase their work."

Mrs McPherson emphasised that the Loddon Valley Arts Trail was open to all local artists, makers, creators and local businesses.

"For example, of the artists and makers I know, there are a couple of painters, a photographer who also has an open garden, a sewer who makes cloth from Aboriginal patterns, as well as Aboriginal artists.

"I'm fairly new to the area so there are people I've met who have come into the shop who would also be more than welcome to be part of the arts trail, for example rustic items they hand make.

"We also know there's a few places around the Loddon Shire that are makers and producers of food — that's an art in itself."

Mrs McPherson said people might also be interested in displaying someone else's work for the arts trail.

"An artist, creator or maker might not have enough space to showcase their works, but someone else might have adequate studio space to do so. For example, the Tarnagulla Tea Shop has been displaying art in their studio space.

"It could be a two-fold thing for the arts trail — food and displaying of works."

Once artists and locations have registered for the Loddon Valley Arts Trail, a "mud map" of locations would be produced.

"This will provide information as to where the work of all our artists, makers and creators can be found, which will let visitors do their own outings — and book accommodation for the weekend," Mrs McPherson said. If you would like to be involved in the Loddon Valley Arts



# Planned burning continues across the state this long weekend

As we head into the long weekend, Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) crews are taking advantage of ideal weather conditions to carry out more than 20 fuel reduction and ecological burns across the state.

If you are travelling this weekend stay informed about planned burns happening at or near your destination as there may be smoke impacts and closures.

FFMVic Chief Fire Officer, Chris Hardman, said crews have ignited approximately 60 planned burns since 19 January 2021, covering 5,670 hectares, to reduce the size, intensity and impact of future bushfires to communities and the environment.

"Following a cooler and wetter summer, thanks to La Niña, FFMVic crews have been able to increase our planned burning program earlier than normal and we will see a further increase in planned burning activity relative to recent years in the coming months," Chief Hardman said.

"We plan and deliver activities as outlined in our bushfire management strategies to achieve the best outcome for protecting lives, property, infrastructure, industry and the environment.

"Fuel management is just one way we manage bushfire risk"

Our strategic bushfire management approach focuses on: A year-round fuel management approach including planned burning, strategic fuel breaks and mechanical works such as slashing, mowing and mulching.

Enhanced capacity and capability of forest firefighters on the ground to respond to fires safely and rapidly.

Ensuring we use the most relevant and scientific approach to bushfire risk modelling to identify priorities.

Traditional Owner-led cultural land and fire practices.

"We take every opportunity when conditions are right, to manage our bushfire risk 365 days a year, with different tools and methods. This includes planned burning on weekends and holidays, and gives us the best chance to get it done effectively with less risk."

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# **Burnt Creek Police Camp**

The first gold rush to Burnt Creek (Bromley) was about February 1853. It was short lived and by March the miners had left. A new rush started in September and the police camp at Jones Creek was moved to Burnt Creek. It was under the command of Commissioner Robert Rede. He later played a role at Eureka Stockade.

Apart from law and order one of the important duties of the police was to secure water supplies. If a large population ran out of water the consequences could be severe. The police camp was set up on the north side of a waterhole in Burnt Creek and that water was then reserved for domestic purposes only.

After two months the bulk of the Burnt Creek police camp was moved to Moliagul leaving only two constables at Burnt Creek. After a while, they too were removed.

The police camp was re-established in October 1854 when the camp at Sandy Creek (Tarnagulla) was moved to Bet Bet. This camp was for the rushes at Burnt Creek and both sides of Sydenham Hill. In some records it was still called Burnt Creek. The Bet Bet police camp was there for a short time before being moved in early 1855. It went back to the old site at Burnt Creek. About March the Kingower police camp was closed and added to Burnt Creek.

JWS Butt was the Commissioner in charge of the camp and Aston Warner was the Gold Receiver. In April 1855 a gold chest containing 418 ounces of gold and £110 in cash was stolen from the police camp.

In August 1855 a new rush started towards Moliagul. Rather than close the camp it was decided that mounted troopers could patrol the new rush on a daily basis. The canvas stables at Burnt Creek were in such bad condition that they could not be moved. There were about six buildings at Burnt Creek. These were probably Commissioner's residence, men's quarters, gold office, cook house, lockup and stables.

By 1857 there were only four police stationed at Burnt Creek. The following year this was reduced to two foot constables. The lockup and most other buildings had been removed. In 1862 the strength was raised to three and a portable lockup moved there.

The police camp closed about 1866. The lockup was moved to Castlemaine.



# Birds of Central Victoria — Brown Falcon

THE WELCOME RECORD



I often walk outside and find one of these lovely birds eyeing off my chooks. The Brown Falcon is one of the most widespread birds in Australia — there is almost nowhere they cannot be seen, at least occasionally. They are most commonly seen perched on power poles, or hovering or flying back and forth over open habitats, especially grasslands and low shrub lands, where they search for prey. They are opportunistic raptors, catching and eating mammals and birds, snakes and insects, with introduced rabbits their most common prey in many places, especially in summer.

Brown Falcons are small to medium-sized raptors (birds of prey). The female is larger than the male. The Brown Falcon has a range of plumage colours, from very dark brown to light brown above and off-white below. Generally, the upperparts are dark brown and the underparts are pale buff or cream. The sides of the head are brown with a characteristic tear-stripe below the eye. The preferred habitat is open grassland and agricultural



areas, with scattered trees or structures such as telegraph poles which it uses for perching.

Brown Falcons are usually seen alone, searching for food from an exposed perch. When prey is sighted, the bird swoops down and grasps it in its claws (talons), killing the prey with a bite to the spine. The powerful bill has specialised "tomial"\*\* teeth and matching notches for this purpose. Less often the species will hunt by hovering or gliding over the ground, often at great heights. Brown Falcons feed on small mammals, insects, reptiles and, less often, small birds.

The nest used by the Brown Falcon is normally an old nest from another hawk species, but the species may build its own stick nest in a tree. Occasionally birds nest in open tree hollows. Both sexes share the incubation of the eggs, and both care for the young, although the female performs the bulk of these duties, while the male supplies most of the food.

\*\* Found in falcons, kites, and accipiters, the TOMIAL TOOTH (pl. mandibular tomia) is the outer, or cutting edge of the beak. This "tooth" is the protrusion that extends from the tomial edge of the beak and is thought to be used to deliver the killing blow to prey. Google search
