Since last year, Jimmi's painting of the Barking Owl has already been a drawcard for locals and tourists, including those following the diverse examples of silo art around the State. The long-awaited unique finishing touches, featuring glow-in-the-dark paint effects and an interactive glow wall are now complemented by a mural, welcoming visitors to what will now be known as The Barking Owl Creative. We look forward to the interactive wall opening for public use in the near future. The silo itself has also become a

local attraction in the fact that, in addition to the artworks, it provides a projection screen for movies and video games, one of many initiatives of Avoca Arts & Gardens.



At a Special Meeting of Council on 15th February, Searle Bros Building Contractors were awarded the contract for stage four of the Carisbrook Recreation Reserve upgrade project.

The stage four works will commence later this month and are expected to be complete by August, 2022.

Stage Four involves the redevelopment of the bowls pavilion and includes: construction of a new Bowls Pavilion; construction of public amenities; and an accessible DDA carpark.

It has been a while since I last wrote a column. In it I wrote about our harvest and the processes that take place to strip grain and deliver it to the silo. I received a lot of positive feedback on this column, so I thought I'd write another 'farm themed' one this week.

Living in a regional shire has a

lot going for it. Wide open spaces, the bush, nature and rolling farm land as far as the eye can see. If you've ever ventured off the beaten path and travelled through our shire's quiet country roads, be it dirt or bitumen, you are bound to come upon livestock being shifted at some stage.

This can be a daunting vista as you come around the corner and all of a sudden the road is full of sheep or other livestock. What do you think you should do and is that the right thing?

I can only speak from my personal experience as a farmer, however I would presume things are pretty similar wherever you go.

First and foremost, SLOW DOWN as the last thing you want to do is hit an animal which can cause substantial damage to your vehicle, let alone the animal that was hit.

If you can see the farmer, he/she may well give you some sort of signal to keep going or stop. Sometimes the sheep are very close to their destination and you can really help a farmer out by stopping for a few minutes to let them get to their paddock without being scattered.

If you can't see the farmer, the best way to safely pass

stock is to drive at walking pace. Move as far to the side of the road as is safe to do so and what your particular vehicle is capable of doing. If you are driving a 4WD you may be able to get close to the fence line. Please use your discretion. Slowly drive through the mob. The sheep will get out of the way and run around your car. Do not toot your horn, as this will only make the sheep run away in the opposite direction. Don't stop your car and stay put either, as this will cause a 'stand-off' between you and the sheep and you may well be stuck there for a very long time.

Stock crossings are slightly different. 'Give Way to Stock' signs are typically displayed 300m before a livestock crossing, but this can vary. When you see one, you must slow down and allow the animals to cross before continuing on your way. The stock have right of way.

When a stop sign is displayed at a stock crossing, you need to come to a complete halt and not start driving again until all the animals have completed their crossing. Both of these stock-related road signs are legally enforceable, so make sure you abide by them, or you may receive a fine.





A history of gold mining around Dunolly with Anne Doran

Appleton's: This reef is half a mile west of the Old Lead Reservoir and was first prospected by seven diggers from Inglewood, who got an immense amount of fine gold in a cradle from the reef and surfacing nearby early in September 1865. The shaft was taken to about 70 feet and worked along its length for 130 feet The reef was from four inches to two feet thick.

Devon: Devon Reef was worked in 1866 and rushed by about 50 diggers after a constant half a hundredweight of gold had been washed from each dish of rubble by the discoverers, Vale and Jones; Gray, the reefer of Inkerman, was one of those present. The situation was one mile northwest of the reservoir.

Catherine: In February 1868 Catherine was reported to be producing four to six ounces of gold to the ton in Dunolly, Reservoir Reserve.

Donald's: A few chains north of Carter's Reef (Donald was one of the early reefers on the Monday Morning Reef). About five hundredweight to the ton was had by Donald.

Gutter-head: In 1861 the *Maryborough & Dunolly Advertiser* reported James Pensam, one of the later rich shareholders of the Queen's Birthday Reef, had a prospecting claim on a rich reef to which he gave the name Gutter-head. It was situated one mile northwest of Dunolly.

McLintock's: Above Spean's Gully and Break-O-Day Gully on the west side of the Inglewood Railway south of Painswick Siding. Shaft 30 feet deep, yielded a few hundredweights per ton. McLintock lived on the Old Lead in the 1880s.

Young's: At the head of the Old Lead, doing well in 1861.

Chinaman's: On the Old Lead. Chinamen got £1000 worth of specimens from this reef which went also five ounces of gold to the ton in November 1876.

Airdies: Worked in 1861 when discovered by Nairn, Witlaw and party by the "Government Reservoir" which, incidentally, was then being built.

Bealiba Reef: So great was the activity on this reef, generally known as the Queen's Birthday Reef, that a book (and an interesting one) could be devoted to the activity surrounding it, which became the site for the fifth and last habitat of the Old Dunolly people. The Queen's Birthday line of reef was undoubtedly discovered by John Hunter Kerr in December 1856, at its northern end in Inkerman, Kerr's party getting some rich specimens from a line of reef described as running for miles, and there is little doubt the Golden Crown Reef

and the Edinburgh reefs, which were going long before 1860, and are a part of Bealiba Reef, were discovered by Kerr and party. It being under the alluvial he did not, of course, discover the rich southern end of the reef at the present town of Goldsborough.

It is generally understood that the celebrated sea captain Henry Evans Baker was the discoverer of the Bealiba Reef, and this is true as far as the actual effective discovery and opening up of the reef is concerned; but the real discoverers were two diggers named King and Wooley who in June 1861 worked on the reef at the time when Baker was running a puddler to the east of the reef. Their registering of a prospector's claim on the reef is mentioned in the *Maryborough & Dunolly Advertiser* on 5th July 186l, but apart from this it was mentioned in *The Express* in 1866 that King, who (as far as can be established) was not Thomas King, the later well-known storekeeper at Goldsborough, lost the ground which held his claim. It was 300 yards northwest of Baker's Machine.


King, the discoverer of the Bealiba Reef, died in Dunolly Hospital on 6th April 1878. Captain Baker's discovery of the reef occurred while excavating earth for a puddling machine and the site of the find today is nearly on the road which runs from Goldsborough Railway Station to the school on the south side. The original hole dug for the puddler is still there. and King's shaft is some distance north of this. The gold was struck about a foot from the surface on 29th December 1863, and Baker, who was in partnership with Robert D. Dodd, took up a prospecting claim which allowed them 150 feet along the reef on the last day of 1863. In January 1864 they took William McLeish and Samuel Crozier into the partnership and the four, holding Miner's Rights only, were able to hold 360 feet under Section 122 of the bylaws. In February they erected a 4hp donkey engine on the site and the first crushing from the new reef in March 1864 yielded 77 ounces of gold. At this time Pike and party had a claim on the area south of Baker's ground and had sunk 35 feet with poor results, and south of this Smith and party, which later became the nucleus of the Queen's Birthday Company, also had a shaft in 1865.

Cynthia's Stories

It must seem like I have been listening to the Slim Dusty song "Looking Forward. Looking Back" because I have been doing quite a lot of that and here I go again. One of my relatives plans to come and stay with me for a short while and just to tease her I told her that I would set a list of rules

That reminded me of the funny notices I saw in London back in my youth when we sometimes stayed at boarding houses. Bathrooms usually asked 'Please leave the bathroom as you found it.' I used to think what if the last person had ignored the sign, that that would let me off. A similar sign would often be seen in the kitchen and I loved the one that said 'An unmade bed means an untidy mind.' There would only be one bathroom for all and the lavatory was the old pull chain. I know someone in Dunolly who has one but he has a magnificent house and that's just a relic of the past to be admired.

Showers were unheard of and when you did find one it would be over the bath, no such thing as a shower stall. My aunt had moved to Brighton, where all the trippers came for weekends and holidays. In her bathroom she had a wooden structure over the bath which was a clothes horse and the wet clothes were placed on the bars and then a cord raised them high up to the ceiling to dry. I found it fascinating.

Going to Brighton beach was a real eye opener for an Australian girl; barely any sand, just pebbles, so shoes were always needed, or people wore little rubber pull ons. Deck chairs dotted the foreshore and people were dressed in the quaintest outfits for beachwear. Men would roll up their trouser legs and remove shoes and socks, take off their jackets to reveal braces and on the head that dreaded knotted handkerchief. I thought it really funny. The ladies would often leave their dresses on and disappear under large hats. Only the children knew how to strip off to play on the beach. Brighton Pier was quite famous among the seaside towns and they would often have the Pierrot concerts, Punch and Judy, and at the end of the pier the tea rooms with the tea dances about which I have already written.

I really enjoyed my weekend visits to my aunts in Brighton and one delight was roaming around the Brighton Lanes, crowded with antique and gift shops and quaint little cafes. I remember staying with my aunts when I first arrived in England and I was asked me to go to the tea shop for some currant buns. I was so delighted to see the brick pavements and the arched mulled windows of the shops. But when I came out it was getting dark and I thought it must be a thunderstorm coming because it was only 3 in the afternoon. It turned out that was the onset of evening in mid winter.

Dear old England. I loved living there but that is well in the past. Just looking forward, no looking back.

Hard waste collection

Council will be conducting its annual kerbside hard waste collection of metals, e-waste, furniture and white goods during March 2022 to coincide with Clean Up Australia Day on the first Sunday in March.

The hard waste collection will be conducted within the township boundaries of Boort, Borung, Bridgewater, Dingee, Eddington, Inglewood, Korong Vale, Laanecoorie, Mitiamo, Newbridge, Pyramid Hill, Serpentine, Tarnagulla, Wedderburn and Wychitella.

Residents in these townships may place items up to a total of one cubic metre out on the nature strip on Sunday 6th March 2022 (not before or after). Council staff will collect these items starting Monday 7th March 2022.

Items are to be sorted into piles, i.e. metal items, furniture, recyclable items, e-waste and white goods. Total volume is not to exceed one cubic metre in size. Excessive or unsorted piles will not be collected.

Please note that general waste, perishables, tyres, oils, batteries, paints and chemicals, car parts and mattresses will not be picked up. Any unsuitable items left behind after collections are to be removed from the nature strip immediately.

Localities or townships not listed above will not be visited by the hard waste collection. Residents in other areas are reminded that Council still provides quarterly fee free waste disposal each year. This allows residents to dispose of up to four cubic metres per voucher of general domestic waste free of charge at each of our landfill and transfer stations. For more information visit:

Central Goldfields Residents and Ratepayers Assoc. Inc.

Council's Tuesday 22nd February Ordinary meeting had a jam-packed agenda — just so much in there. Our Councillors have hit the ground running for 2022. It is fantastic to see the Deledio Oval plans in Dunolly have a mention, plus to see Carisbrook levee stage four also be put out for tender. It appears in the next few months there is a mountain of work for Council to accomplish their Capital Works Target.

Regarding the Capital works list in the 2020-21 Budget, there was a listing of over \$15 million capital works. That was boasted as being one of the largest Capital Works for our shire and the Council obtained some BIG mileage out of this, it did sound fantastic.

In the 2021 Annual Report it stated \$7 million was achieved for Capital works for 2020-21, with \$5 million carried over to this year, and the rest unreported. This year in capital works our Council still boasts \$20 million. Of that \$20m the Maryborough pool, Carisbrook levee, skate park, station upgrade (to mention a few) appear all to be carried over to the next financial year. The question we ask is why still claim \$20 million when it actually appears there is less than \$14 million and dropping? Is the cost of the budget justified by its end result?

Item 8.6 was of interest, Erratum Issued Annual report. There were several corrections, the one which raised a few concerns was that the cost for Elected Councillors was altered from \$120,000 to \$58,000. We were unable to locate this item in the 2020-21 Annual Report and found it in the Know Your Council (Govt. website). We note that \$58,000 is still \$16,000 above small shire average.

CGR&RAI raised this \$120 million figure with Council and were given three different answers from Council senior representatives, also an excuse on the Know Your Council site, then to find that the figures were reduced drastically with no excuse. One report we were given prior to this was that the incorrect data was supplied to the Know Your Council website. This is the second year that Council has had to publish a correction after CGR&RAI have questioned an item.

Why did our Councillors not pick this up when they voted on this — do they not know whether they have \$120,000 or \$58,000 for costs (Governance)? Our Shire is recovering from well-publicised past events, and the Council needs to provide straightforward honest reports and professionalism to demonstrate their intention to gain the confidence of the community and work alongside them. We look forward to seeing that being demonstrated. Last week with the concern around the closing of the Museum of Australian History and Art at the Maryborough Railway Station, Council's excuses have been vague and at times secretive around the reasons and the future plans. It is believed they will be using a government grant to fuel the new direction. This is a

community project, so why will the Council not inform the community? It is reported to have been in the pipeline for some time, so we question the community consultation used and the motive behind this. CGR&RAI also question the thought, respect and consideration used by the Council for the Museum owner, the Council's assessment of the worth of this museum and its contribution to our shire. We hope that Council treat this situation with the respect they would expect for themselves, and trust there will be a positive outcome to this situation.

Another week has rolled on and the COVID restrictions appear to be reducing; fingers crossed for it to continue this way. Hopefully soon there will be a non-discriminatory economy and we can get back to a normal society. There have been many positive and some negative aspects from this past two years. Look at the positives out of this, set our targets for a strong recovery from Covid and also support those who have differing opinions on many aspects over the past two years.

Many of our shop owners have followed procedures and medical advice, so please give them a thought, as I am sure a lot of them do not wish to impose restrictions upon anyone. Please understand and work together. Our attitude and community spirit are what we are calling on, in driving us to being the strongest-recovering shire in Australia. We thank you all for your diligence and amazing care by keeping our community one of the lowest-affected communities in Victoria, so let us continue to move forward with pride.





Google Voice Scams Targeting Facebook Marketplace Scammers are out there pretending to be potential buyers. Here's how the scam unfolds: They ask you to provide your cell phone number — they might use any one of a number of excuses. For example, to schedule a time to pick up a package, to (ironically) make sure you are not a scammer, or to verify your identity as the owner of the item for sale or, in other cases, if you've lost your pet and posted about it online, scammers will falsely claim that they found your pet and wish to return it to you. Whatever reason they give, it's nonsense. Please refer to example below.



Once they've got your number, they use it to register for a Google Voice account under your name. Then Google Voice will send you a verification code. The scammer then asks you to send them the 6-digit verification code. Please don't fall for it! With the code, they can get a new Google Voice account in your name. They will then use that account to commit identity theft or other cybercrimes while posing as you.

Conveyance Allowance

The conveyance allowance is a form of financial assistance to help families in rural and regional Victoria with the cost of transporting their children to their nearest appropriate school/campus. The conveyance allowance is available to eligible students travelling by public transport, private car and private bus. The conveyance allowance is also available to eligible students whose nearest school is not serviced by a free school bus.


Eligibility criteria

The eligibility criteria varies depending on the type of school attended and where it is located.

Students attending a government or non-government school must:

- Attend their nearest government or non-government school/campus appropriate to their year level at which admission is permissible.
- Be enrolled at a school/campus outside Melbourne's metropolitan conveyance boundary.
- Reside 4.8km or more by the shortest practicable route from the nearest bus stop, public transport or from the school/campus attended if no bus service is available.
- Be of school age (5 to 18 years old at time of application) and reside in Victoria.

Applications close on Monday 28th February 2022, forms are available from the school's office



COVID Safe measures

- Fully vaccinated parents/carers are permitted on site (once your certificate has been seen by Mrs Lacey you are added to the register).
- Air purifiers are in place around the school.
- Staff and students are wearing masks. P-2 students are encouraged to do so while 3-6 students are required to do so.
- Rapid antigen tests have been supplied to all families. We encourage you to be testing twice a week.
- Vaccination appointments are available for 5 to 11 year old children in Maryborough.
- Hand hygiene is promoted.
- Anyone displaying symptoms of being unwell must stay home.
