Victoria enjoys eased mask rules, new local cases continue

Victorians have relaxed into a week of eased restrictions, including those affecting face masks which no longer need to be worn in most settings. Following low daily cases, from midnight last Friday workers could return to offices, and all elective surgery got underway from Monday. Face masks are now only required in high risk settings including public transport, visitors to hospitals and care facilities, students in years three and above at primary school, plus workers in multiple sectors including hospitality, retail, and primary schools/early childhood centres. There were several new cases in the Central Goldfields this week, including 14 recorded on Thursday, with a total 56 cases still active. Since the pandemic began there have been 837 cases in the Central Goldfields. Meanwhile in shires like the Pyrenees there are still 45 active cases, in Mount Alexander 114 active, 74 in Hepburn and 28 in Loddon. All have recorded new cases this week. There were 7093 new cases recorded across Victoria yesterday, and sadly 23 more lives were lost. Along with Wednesday (7126 new cases) it was the first time in two weeks new daily cases have risen above 7000. State-wide, 59.8 percent of residents aged 18 and over have received three vaccine doses. In the Maryborough area up to 70 percent of those eligible have received their third vaccine dose. Up to 65 percent of children aged five to 11 in Maryborough, who recently became eligible for vaccination, have now had their first dose.

Council backs \$5m Deledio Pavilion project

Concept plans for the \$5 million redevelopment of Dunolly's Deledio Pavilion have been backed by the Central Goldfields Shire Council. During last month's ordinary council meeting, councillors moved a motion to note the Deledio Pavilion concept plans and support officers to continue to work with local groups to investigate funding options and provide support for making grant applications, with the concept plans detailing works including a complete replacement of the pavilion. According to the report tabled to council, the Deledio Recreation Reserve (Dunolly) Master Plan 2011-2020 identified a new pavilion as a high priority after it was determined that the building was not suitable for an upgrade but needed to be replaced.

"The existing club rooms are no longer fit for purpose. There is extensive termite damage, a cracked concrete slab, very poor change facilities and kitchen facilities. The building has no female change rooms and lacks disability access," the report reads. It also states that the Deledio Recreation Reserve is a Crown Land site managed by the Dunolly Recreation Reserve Committee of Management Inc (DRRCM), which established a subcommittee, the Deledio Reserve Sports Committee (DRSC), to be the local steering committee for the development of the new facility. Council has previously committed budget funds for design and in April 2020 Avor Architecture were appointed to develop the concept plans and costings. During the meeting, Flynn Ward councillor Liesbeth Long said she was "absolutely stoked" to move the motion.

"Since becoming the councillor for Flynn Ward I have attended DRRCM meetings and I'm so proud of this small but enthusiastic group of volunteers who have worked tirelessly for many, many years to bring the new Deledio Pavilion to reality," she said. "The concept plans are impressive and if completed will serve Dunolly and the wider community for many years to come. There was a meeting (before the council meeting) and always, the passion around the table was tangible. At the end of the meeting an action list was drawn up and every member left with a list of jobs to continue working on before next month's meeting, myself included."

Cr Long said the committee is hopeful funding will be sourced "in the not so distant future" and have vowed to ramp up their own fundraising efforts this calendar year.

"Watch this space," she said. According to the business case, the facility is set to be utilised by a number of groups, including the Dunolly Football Netball Club, Laanecoorie Dunolly Cricket Club, Dunolly CFA, Golden Triangle Archers, Dunolly Primary School, Dunolly Horse Activity Club and the general community.

"It is anticipated that improved facilities will attract new user groups and more use by existing groups, that is expanded sporting competitions including female teams, more school events, more meetings, more presentations by sporting clubs, workshops, training, conference, expos, markets, swap meets, etc," the report reads.

"They will enable a more equitable use of the facility with a broader range of community members such as seniors and those with a disability being able to access the building." Seconding the motion, councillor Anna De Villiers said as ward councillor for Tullaroop she has also been involved with the Carisbrook Recreation Reserve committee, working on the development of the site, which is currently at stage three of its four-stage project. "Having walked into a rec reserve committee that got grants of up to \$4 million, I wish you and the Deledio committee luck and I hope that you are successful and that you manage to gain some huge grants," she said. "Keep the dream up, no dream is too big."

The council report states in May 2019 a Community Hub Business Case was developed by DRRCM, who commissioned community vibe. As part of the report, change rooms (home and away), trainer's room, first aid, gym, commercial kitchen, bar, social room, public toilets, technology access, storerooms, offices, hallways (memorabilia display), timekeepers' box and balcony were identified for the new facility. According to the council report, to carry out the project build funding support will be required through a combination of council, state and federal sources at a higher level than is available via existing government programs.

"The local committee is also developing and implementing fund raising initiatives and actively lobbying Members of Parliament. Council officers will continue to work with the group to provide advice and support," it reads.

New operation introduced in bid to save lives on the road

Victoria Police has launched a new campaign in a bid to save lives on the road this March, with figures showing it's the most dangerous month for road trauma. Operation Engage, which began earlier this week, will see police targeting road users in priority locations across the month. A total 25 fatalities were recorded in March last year, something police will seek to avoid repeating, with 48 lives already lost on Victoria's roads since January. The figure includes a significant spike in motorcycle fatalities which have increased two-fold compared with the previous 12 months. Victoria Police Assistant Commissioner Road Policing Glenn Weir said the road trauma experienced during March was "unacceptable". "March is becoming synonymous with road trauma and it's about time we changed that — it's completely unacceptable," he said. "With such a terrible start to the year on our roads, we're really ramping up our focus on road safety this month. All road users should expect to see Victoria Police out on roads. We'll be targeting speeding, impaired driving, fatigue and people not wearing seatbelts — all major contributors to road

Police intelligence shows over the past five years road trauma collisions in both rural and metropolitan Melbourne peaked in March. Speed, drink and drug driving, fatigue and motorists not wearing seatbelts were the biggest contributors. Motorcycle collisions also historically peak in March with police to engage with riders on taking extra precautions to stay safe. Heavy vehicles will be targeted with random compliance checks throughout the month. Operation Engage will include a police blitz over the Labour Day long weekend as people head to the regions, with more than 60 percent of road fatalities this year recorded on rural roads. The number of lives lost in March last year was second only to November, during which 28 lives were lost on the road. Operation Engage will conclude at 11.59pm on Thursday, March 31st.

Cr Liesbeth Long Message



As a Councillor, I am often approached by residents in our community who are curious about the differences between building and planning permits. You wouldn't be alone if you have felt confused and frustrated by the many and varied rules and requirements. Whether building a farm shed, your

dream home or simply adding a new pool or deck, you should always check with Council to see what the requirements are and whether you need to obtain a planning and/or building permit.

In simple terms, planning permits decide what can be built on your land, while building permits decide how that work will take place. Planning permits are always dealt with by Council whereas building permits can be issued by Private Building Surveyors. So where to start?

For planning permits, I would recommend going straight to the source. Council. If you are considering buying land, it can often be tempting to take at face value what the real estate advert says or to simply trust the views of agents, vendors and neighbours. Whilst they certainly have plenty of knowledge and are terrific resources, it is the Council planners that will give you unbiased, factual information and I urge you to use them as early in the process as possible to mitigate potential heartache. COVID has meant changes to the ways that Council gives advice, but I am assured you can still call any weekday and arrange to speak to someone in the planning team. Further, there is currently work being

done to update the website to be more informative and user friendly.

When it comes to building permits, I acknowledge this can be a little trickier. Do you speak to Council, a builder or a private surveyor? The Council building team has had some staff shortages in recent times, as have many other regional councils. (Hot tip: If you know of any one starting or wanting to change career paths, tell them to become a private surveyor!) However, starting with Council for general information is a good first step. Once you have identified the requirements you can then look to private surveyors. Council has a comprehensive list of regional building surveyors to get you started, but feel free to use anyone you like.

There are no easy answers when it comes to planning and building, and unfortunately there will be times when what you are trying to achieve doesn't match up with the rules and regulations. My advice, before you shell out hard earned money on buying that piece of land, having plans drawn, or ordering that shed, talk to Council. They will work with you to help you understand what you need to do and give you an idea of how successful any application might be.

It is easier said than done but allowing yourself enough time to go through the process is worth doing. Due to its very nature, planning and building will always be changing, as it is largely dictated by the State Government and not always within Council's control. Getting informed on the details of your property is highly recommended and utilizing Council staff for knowledge will hopefully ease your experience with the planning or building process.




What's on at the Neighbourhood Centre?

Stories from Cynthia

This is a dog story, not really a shaggy dog one, although under the circumstances it could almost be classified as that. My daughter recently moved to Hervey Bay, of which I often write, and since then her little dog reached the end of her life. Recently she was asked to take on two dogs for an indefinite stay due to an emergency situation in the owner's life, causing her to move interstate. The two dogs, Buddy and Holly, yes, boy and girl, won over my daughter's heart immediately. They were medium size with fluffy white coats and both friendly and well trained. After a week or so of settling them in to their new home Daughter decided to give them a treat and take them out for a beach walk, something she really enjoyed, but now she had two eager companions. Being Hervey Bay most people are close to the water and my daughter lived within walking distance of her beach. On arrival, she was dismayed to see a No Dogs sign, so had to rethink her plan. A helpful person directed her to a dog friendly spot, so off they went again.

Arriving at this new beach Daughter was not impressed. First thing she saw was an inlet flowing under a bridge and there was a rather unpleasant smell. Just to add to it Buddy decided to make his mark with a deposit on the sand. So now that had to be placed in the poo bag and had to be carried along too. In order to get on to the beach they had to walk through a shallow stream of incoming water. Then the two dogs were free to explore. When it was time to go back Daughter headed for the spot where they had crossed on arrival, but it didn't look right so she turned back and in so doing suddenly found herself slipping down a sand dune and the dogs, now on leads, sliding down too. They had to clamber back up and with a backpack hindering progress and clutching the poo bag and dog leads, she was embarrassingly scrambling up on hands and knees. The stream to be crossed had now deepened which she likened to the English Channel, and was above her knees and the dogs had to swim across. On arrival on dry ground Buddy and Holly had a little roll in the sand and their leader had to put two sodden, sandy dogs in her fairly new car.

What had started off as a delightful beach walk with dogs had faded into a semi disaster never to be re visited. Thankfully my daughter has since discovered a friendlier beach for dogs and their owners.

Japanese encephalitis: further detections on Victorian farms

Japanese encephalitis virus has now been confirmed as the cause of death of piglets at three separate pig farms in Victoria's north; one in the Loddon Shire, one in the Campaspe Shire and one in the Wangaratta Shire.

The mosquito-borne zoonotic disease, which was previously considered exotic to Australia, has also been confirmed in piggeries in New South Wales and Queensland. Agriculture Victoria has established an incident management team with staff on the ground to conduct surveillance activities and to provide information and advice to farmers.

Chief Veterinary Officer Dr Graeme Cooke said that since the announcement of the first positive Japanese encephalitis detection last weekend, a number of Victorian farmers had made contact with Agriculture Victoria and submitted samples for testing.

"Japanese encephalitis virus causes reproductive failure in pigs, primarily through stillbirths and piglets that may show signs of central nervous system disease," said Dr Cooke. Japanese encephalitis can be transmitted to humans through infected mosquitoes and in rare cases can cause encephalitis — a central nervous system disease which can be life threatening so we are working closely with the Department of Health to understand the implications and to communicate to farmers how they can reduce the risk of human exposure. Infection is not spread directly from pigs to people and there is no risk to humans from eating pig meat."

Agriculture Victoria is also encouraging horse owners to take steps to protect their horses as they are also susceptible to Japanese encephalitis if bitten by infected mosquitoes.

In horses, symptoms include lethargy, nervous signs or sometimes hyperexcitability. To date there have been no confirmed cases of Japanese encephalitis in horses in Australia. "Horse owners are encouraged to reduce mosquito breeding grounds near their horses to reduce the chances of them being bitten," Dr Cooke said.

"Stabling at night, the use of a light cotton rug and fly mask and application of a safe insect repellent may also help." Japanese encephalitis is also a notifiable disease under the Livestock Disease Control Act. Dr Cooke encouraged animal owners to report any cases of unexplained pig deaths, especially piglets, or unexplained horse illnesses, to the 24-hour Emergency Animal Disease Watch Hotline on 1800 675 888, to your local vet or to Agriculture Victoria animal health staff. 
Register AEDs with Ambulance Victoria

Our Council's Priority Projects are very welcome to read. Over the past few years, we have had the same projects named, most claimed in the Budget and then passed from year to year. Projects like the Maryborough Pool (\$2M), Carisbrook levee (\$1.8M), the Art Gallery (\$2M), Skate Park (\$645K), not to mention the Maryborough Airport and the Station arts millions. Approximately \$5M has been carried over for several years and has been once again. Yet our Council claim this year \$20M capital works, when what they really have is several past projects moved forward to next Budget.

The Council's 2022 Priority Works Project is a little different this year; it seems to be more focused on items which actually can be completed, several of which have already been started. The Castlemaine to Maryborough Rail Trail, which CGR&RAI feels is not such a priority for instance; we believe that more important issues could be addressed ahead of this. The Splash Park and Youth Hub have been priority projects of the past few years, yet are scrapped for 2022.

This was possibly a much more realistic Priority Projects list and hopefully a much more realistic Capital Works Budget, which we feel will assist our direction of heading forward. We would rather see achievable projects and results, instead of the same projects over and over and still not completed

With the 2022-23 Budget in the wind, CGR&RAI finds it quite disturbing that our Shire is rated as one of the worst performing re planning and management shires in Victoria, yet our Councillors still speak of our highly efficient and capable Council management. We wonder if possibly comparing our performance to other shires and acting on those shires' efficient systems could possibly be an answer. We, in the four years have hardly recovered from the sacking situation, so maybe it's time our Council and Councillors started looking at improving our management behaviour and council processes. Working more efficiently and streamlining processes which we believe will have a HUGE positive effect.

On the subject of streamlining and efficiency, is our FOI situation. Our two outstanding FOIs -the Carisbrook levee grants application and CEO's KPIs from last year

have now been provided and closed. The levee issues were two years and the KPIs eight months in the process. We thank the Shire for finally providing the information. Both we believe could have been resolved with a phone call and discussion though, and not spending $2\frac{1}{2}$ years of our FOI Commissioner and Council's time; obviously this was a path which had to be taken but hopefully there will be no need for this to happen again.


Over the past two weeks, we have raised concerns with the Shire over the Goldfields Reservoir security camera and the Station Arts project. To date we have received reasonably good responses from Council and are extremely pleased with that. Hopefully this is a sign of the future.

With the rain events of recent weeks, there has been a large concern around the Shire's maintenance of the waterways and drains. One would think that standard maintenance and upkeep of these waterways and drains would be a yearly allocation and a standard requirement. Another issue which has raised interest with the loss of

Another issue which has raised interest with the loss of the Station (Keith's) Museum, is our tourism direction. The number of tourism attractions and markets which have closed in recent years is really quite alarming. Council's policy has always been not to improve local attractions but to support and assist those existing attractions. Maybe we need to address that policy; it is all very well to say we have millions for the Station Arts development. Our Council's history of arts projects which have not been completed is quite amazing. Maybe Council should look at finishing the Dunolly mosaics, the book seats and see how they attract tourists; we have not seen any of them advertised as an attraction for our Shire. Fantastic to see Dunolly leading the way with attractions and markets though, with Talbot close behind.

It is good to have a Tourism Information Centre in the beautiful station, but we need other attractions, not just to attract tourists but to make them want to stay. A successful strong community will move forward under sound community-minded management; our strength is in working together. Thank you.

Grand Opera in Bendigo

The Central Goldfields is set to become the Glyndebourne of Australia with the announcement by the acclaimed Melbourne Opera company to stage Wagner's entire Ring cycle at the Ulumbarra theatre in 2023. The four grand operas that comprise the Ring Cycle will be staged over six weeks with two operas each weekend. The 900-seat auditorium has an intimacy rarely experienced by the so-called "ring-nuts" as the Wagner opera lovers are sometimes known. Opera lovers are known to travel around the world to seek out productions, and the Ulumbarra announcement will prove to be a boon for tourism and accommodation in the district. Ring cycles have rarely been attempted in Australia as they are so expensive to produce and require monumental staging and large orchestra. 'Die Walkure' is the second of the four Ring cycle operas which are 16 hours in total. In his 'Ring' Cycle Wagner uses musical themes to create a world of gods, heroes, giants as well as love and death. Some have suggested Tolkien's 'Lord of the Rings' was directly derived from Richard Wagner's opera cycle whose plot also centres on a powerful ring from Germanic mythology. The capacity audience on Sunday

at the Ulumbarra theatre was immersed in the music and brilliant staging right from the first note in the orchestra pit. I've always attended Opera Melbourne's productions in the Atheneum which came to a grinding halt during COVID.

Now the theatre productions are back in force. It is truly special that we can now have world class opera in our district. If you have never experienced Wagner's music and wonder why I wax lyrical – take a moment on your computer to listen to a version of the 'Ride of the Valkyries' and imagine yourself surrounded by a huge orchestra. This was bliss indeed.

In The Veggie Patch

Autumn is with us again and we look for some cooler weather, also some. good rains, hopefully. Old plants that occupy space in the garden are better taken out, to make way for the next planting season. These plants not only use up soil nutrients, they also harbour pests and diseases. Vacant space that will be left idle to Springtime, can be sown with a green manure crop. Oat crops can be turned into the soil when 30 cm high. Clover can be left until it starts to flower, if the space is not needed before planting time. Both these varieties are rich in nitrogen. By sowing green manure crops over the winter months, it saves weeding.

Sow mustard or rocket seeds where tomato, potato or pumpkin plants have been removed to help reduce nematodes in the soil. When plants are 30 to 40 cm high dig into soil, for best results keep soil moist to decompose greens and release beneficial chemicals.

Seeds to sow this month are silver beet, radish, beetroot, lettuce, white onions, spring and salad onions, English spinach, Japanese turnip, broad beans and Asian cabbages. Good fresh seedlings of broccoli and cauliflower can still be planted out, plus salad, spring onions and late leeks.

Plant garlic cloves in autumn, for harvesting in late spring-summer. Garlic requires well drained, enriched (well rotted animal manure/compost) soil in full sun. Additional lime is also beneficial in soils with a neutral to low ph.

Plant pointy end up, cover the cloves with soil, sprinkle some blood and bone or other slow-release organic fertiliser over the top and water well. Don't water again until the cloves have sprouted, then apply some mulch.

For harvested potatoes, store in a jute bag and keep in a dark cool place, if exposed to sun and wind they soon go green and useless.



Fruit Trees

For any fruit trees holding a heavy crop of fruit, it is best to support the limbs with props, if limbs get badly bent down they will not go back up once the fruit is off them. If you are planning to plant new fruit trees Autumn is the best time to prepare the ground for planting and order your trees. Some varieties need at least two trees so they can cross-pollinate, and it's wise to research which varieties best suit your local climate and soil, and which make good pollen partners before purchase.

Autumn Garden Tips



Make sure your garden beds are mulched well — top up mulch to conserve moisture, suppress weeds, keep roots cool and improve the soil as it decomposes.

- * Deadhead and fertilise roses and perennials to improve the plants' overall appearance, encourage new growth and promote an additional flush of flowers.
- * Plant or order Spring bulbs, daffodils, freesias and jonquils can be planted from now.
- * Sow or plant some violas, pansies or stocks in pots or garden beds.

How to sow and grow sweet peas



Sweet peas are climbers which will grow up anything they can get their tendrils around. Grow up a trellis, tee pee, or netting on a frame to create a temporary screen. Sow in Autumn, traditionally on 17th March, St

Patricks Day but can be sown until late April.

- * Choose a well drained position in full sun where you can enjoy their colour and fragrance.
- * Improve soil with compost and an application of lime if your soil is acidic. Do this a few weeks before sowing
- * Sow seed directly 20cm apart and 2 cm deep and protect from snails and slugs. Water sparingly until seedlings emerge.
- * Water regularly and pick flowers frequently to encourage a prolonged flowering season.



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20 Million reasons to celebrate school breakfast clubs

Hundreds of thousands of Victorian students are now starting the school day with full stomachs, clearer minds and better moods, with the Andrews Labor Government's School Breakfast Clubs program celebrating 20 million meals served.

School Holiday Supply packs are also available for schools to order over the summer school holiday period for families who need support.

Nearly 40,000 packs have been distributed since the program began, with the 14-day food packs expanded last year to include lunch items in addition to healthy breakfasts and snacks.





A grade washed out, most of A reserve plays on amid rain

While the Maryborough area was treated to more than 24 millimetres of rain on Saturday, washing out both A grade cricket games, the Pyrenees was home and dry with three A reserve games getting underway in an emotional day for cricketers around the nation. On Saturday, Australians woke up to the shock news of beloved Australian leg-spinner Shane Warne's death, just hours after the passing of former Australian test wicket keeper Rodney Marsh. Local tributes poured in for both Marsh and the legendary 'king of spin', Warne with cricketers asked to don a black armband if they were taking to the pitch. While local A grade cricketers didn't get the chance in the Maryborough District Cricket Association, with the MKM v Clunes game at Ron Sinclair and Colts Phelans versus Beaufort at Hedges Oval both washed out, A reserve cricketers carried the bat, with Beaufort defeating MKM, Natte Yallock beating Laanecoorie-Dunolly and the game between Avoca and Talbot washed out just two overs shy of a full innings. The other A reserve game set to be played at Bull Millgate between Clunes and Colts Phelans was abandoned and Carisbrook missed the hassle, given it had the bye. No other team would have cursed the rain on Saturday like Avoca did, leading by 95 runs after 74 of 80 overs at home in a topof-the-table clash with Talbot. The Yabbies, who sit atop the A reserve ladder, have lost just a single game this season and looked in real trouble of dropping their second Saturday after Avoca elected to bat first, bowled out for 174 in 38

At Natte Yallock, Laanecoorie-Dunolly won the toss and elected to bat first, but struggled to score on the Swans' deck, amid their bowling, with 8/82 in 40 overs. Brad McHugh was the only Laanecoorie-Dunolly batter to make double digits, high scoring with 33 runs from fourth. Natte captain Trent Mortlock was the best with the ball in hand, taking 3/15, only marginally in front of Brock Freeman who

took 3/16, while Brady Templeton contributed 1/24. Natte used 27 overs of its reply to win by seven wickets with a score of 3/91, losing its opening batsmen Kurt Mortlock (6) and Ryan Weir (4) for 10 runs combined, but Templeton (19), Trent (35 not out) and Zac Mortlock (12 not out) coming up with the runs needed for victory. Young Joe Lovel was Laanecoorie-Dunolly's best bowler, taking 1/9 from six overs.
