Come and have a chat, meet our dedicated, hardworking community members who embody the "SOUL" of our community.



PREVENT NUMBER PLATE THEFT

ACV and Neighbourhood Watch Victoria are encouraging motorists to take precautions to protect their vehicles following a sharp rise in number plate theft.

In Victoria, 18,481 number plates were stolen over the 12-month period ending March 2024, a 23%increase on the 15,009 stolen in the previous year following the release of the latest data from the Victorian Crime Statistics Agency.

CEO of Neighbourhood Watch Victoria Bambi Gordon highlighted the importance of addressing the issue and the wider implications of number plate theft.

"While having your number plate stolen may just seem like a low-level crime, the reality is it can have very serious ramifications for motorists — including the potential involvement in identity theft and criminal activities," Ms Gordon said.



RACV and Neighbourhood Watch Victoria recommend the following tips to help prevent number plate theft:

 Use anti-theft screws: Install anti-theft screws on your number plates to deter thieves from easily removing them. "No matter where you live or how you use your vehicle, you can be susceptible. It's really important for everyone who owns a vehicle to take preventative measures to safeguard their number plates."

- Park in well-lit areas: Whenever possible, park your vehicle in well-lit and populated areas to reduce the risk of theft.
- Utilise security cameras: If you have access to security cameras, position them to monitor your vehicle and deter potential thieves.
- Consider anti-theft devices: Explore the use of antitheft devices such as locking plate frames or security markings to add an extra layer of protection.

If your number plates are stolen, it's important to report the theft immediately to local police and VicRoads.

You should also notify your insurance company and roadside assistance of your new registration details.

Rural Victoria Sexual Abuse Impact Study

a Trobe University, in partnership with the Centre Against Sexual Violence Central Victoria (CASA-CV), has released the findings of an important study.

This study is highlighting the struggles of rural and regional victim survivors in the pursuit of justice.

This research, conducted in a collaboration between the two organisations, highlights the unique experiences and obstacles that survivors in regional and rural areas face.

Recent La Trobe PhD student Dr Emily Corbett conducted the comprehensive industry-based study to examine the sexual revictimisation of rural and regional women, and her findings will inform future research, practice and policy recommendations.

Dr Corbett said that while research shows women subjected to child sex abuse had a higher risk of suffering sexual abuse in adulthood, little research has been done on this topic in non-urban areas.

"We found that many regional and rural women face significant structural disadvantage including low levels of employment and income, limited-service sector resources, unsafe family environments, and exposure to community violence. Violence can be perpetuated due to social isolation, lack of transport options, and limited awareness and education about sexual or family violence. The close-knit nature of small communities can create barriers to women seeking help," Dr Corbett said.

This research is the culmination of a 3½ year study conducted by Dr Corbett whose research was funded via scholarship through the La Trobe Research Industry Partnership and CASA-CV.

"This research would not have been possible without the crucial contribution from the women who participated in the research. We thank them for sharing their knowledge and experiences."

It gives me a warm glow to look at it and remember Grandma measuring the tea leaves into a pot as she made a cuppa for herself and her family.

The tea caddy is a strong reminder of her, to me. But I expect when it is time to clean out my house, my family will perhaps have a garage sale and the tea caddy will be bought by a stranger.

After all, my children never knew Grandma and so don't feel a connection. But any stranger who buys it will presumably like it, and that feels like a fitting end for it.



The Australian Space Weather Alert System says: "Coronal mass ejections occur when large clouds of plasma and magnetic field erupt in the Sun's outer atmosphere."

When the mass ejections hit Earth, they cause geomagnetic storms, also known as magnetic storm, which are a temporary disturbance of the Earth's magnetosphere caused by a solar wind shock wave.

Block online alcohol content for Kids

n a new study published recently in the Health Promotion Journal of Australia, La Trobe University researchers found large support for a browser plug-in that blocks online alcohol-related imagery to prevent young people being influenced to start drinking alcohol, or drinking to excess.

Lead researcher from La Trobe's Centre for Alcohol Policy Research, Maree Patsouras, said depictions of alcohol were common online, and there was a clear relationship between alcohol exposure and alcohol use.

"A large portion of the people we interviewed in this study believed that viewing online alcohol imagery could cause temptation and cravings to drink alcohol," Ms Patsouras said.

"The majority of our participants believed that a browser plug-in that blocked alcohol imagery was an easy intervention tool for both parents and people experiencing alcohol-related problems or trying to reduce their drinking.

"The evidence collected from this study could help support future health promotion strategies to consider the development of such software."

The study participants described being exposed to alcohol-related advertising online, regardless of whether they were actively searching for it.

Participants indicated that online alcohol exposure served as a reminder to drink and brought alcohol to the forefront of their minds, even if they were not considering drinking beforehand.





One participant described alcohol exposure as "triggering" thoughts about alcohol.

"If you see it, you think about it...it just triggers the thought in your brain and then you start craving it,"

Participants highlighted that young people needed to be protected from online alcohol exposure because they were impressionable and vulnerable.

There was a concern that online alcohol exposure taught minors that drinking was socially acceptable, fun, or exciting, which could lead to earlier alcohol consumption.

Participants supported the development of an alcohol imagery blocking browser plug-in, alongside stricter governmental regulation, and restrictions for alcohol-related marketing and exposure.

One participant who supported the development of the plug-in, also emphasised the need for increased legislation.

"I'm sad that (the plug-in) is necessary. I really think that this should be legislated at the government level, and restricted that way." they concluded.



Bowlers are reminded that next week is supper night.


