

# NEW NATIONAL STANDARD FOR PSYCHOTROPIC MEDICINES

he Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Health Care (the Commission) has just introduced a national standard to improve the care of people with cognitive disability or impairment.

The Psychotropic Medicines in Cognitive Disability or Impairment Clinical Care Standard outlines clear actions to ensure the responsible and appropriate use of psychotropic medicines, representing a significant step towards ensuring safer, more effective treatment practices.

The Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety and the Royal Commission into Violence, Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation of People with Disability revealed concerning trends in psychotropic medicines misuse and overuse in the aged care and disability sectors.


**Professor Eddy Strivens, Geriatrician and Clinical Director,** Cairns and Hinterland Hospital and Health Service, emphasised the need for coordinated efforts,

"This is a supportive Standard for prescribers and clinicians. It provides practical information, encourages sharing information across care settings, and will help ensure that these agents are used least and last, rather than first and foremost."

The Standard aims to curb the inappropriate use of psychotropic medicines and promote patient safety. It highlights the importance of non-medication interventions as the primary method for addressing behaviours of concern, with psychotropic medicines reserved as a last resort option when other strategies have failed, or there is a high risk of harm to the person or others.

Importantly, non-medication strategies should be designed around the person's individual needs and expressed wishes, and in consultation with family and others the person has agreed, should be involved in their care.

Over the past three decades, there has been a staggering 60% increase in psychotropic medicine prescriptions for all Australians<sup>1</sup>. While an increased awareness of the risks associated with using these medicines has led to a slight decline in antipsychotic prescriptions among older Australians<sup>2</sup>, significant challenges persist.



Older people are particularly susceptible to adverse effects from psychotropic medicines, including worsening cognition and an increased risk of falls, stroke, and death. In Australia, aged care residents have a 22% higher risk of death in the first 100 days when antipsychotics<sup>3</sup>, a commonly used type of psychotropic medicine, are prescribed. Around a third of people with intellectual disability are prescribed psychotropic medicines and are exposed to potential short and long-term adverse effects.

While psychotropic medicines play an important role in treating mental health conditions, they are also commonly used to manage behaviours of concern experienced by people with cognitive disability or impairment. This is despite the known harms of these medicines and the lack of evidence that they are effective for managing behaviours, which may include aggression, agitation, and sometimes self-harm.

The Standard applies to all healthcare services provided to people of all ages with cognitive disability or impairment and is relevant in any setting where they receive care, including hospitals, aged care facilities and the community.

### Telstra 3G Extension

Telstra is giving their customers who have not upgraded their devices an extra two months to prepare before they switch off their 3G network on **31 August 2024**. All 3G networks across Australia have been switched off, or are closing. Once the network is switched off, old devices that rely on 3G won't work anymore, so they'll need to be upgraded.

This includes devices like: 3G-only mobile phones, 4G-enabled mobiles that rely on 3G for emergency calls; Other devices that rely on 3G, like medical devices and some of the older EFTPOS terminals.

To check if you need a new mobile. **SMS** '3' to 3498 and Telstra will tell you if your handset needs to be updated.

Watch this space- we are soon to purchase a double-door fridge for fresh produce, thanks to GrainCorp!


# OUR THANKS TO THE WELCOME RECORD FOR 'CONNECTING DUNOLLY'.




# Virtuoso International Pianist Kevin Taminini



# Connection Postcard for over 1 million Victorians

ustralia Post and Beyond Blue's mental health campaign – the Connection Postcard Program, in its fourth year, expands to reach 5 million mailboxes including every regional and rural home across Australia, with over one million households in Victoria alone.

These postcards carry important mental health messages to encourage greater community connection and support mental wellbeing across the country.

With research\* indicating that nearly one in three Australians grapple with loneliness, especially in remote or regional areas, this initiative offers a simple way for people to connect via a newly designed two-part 'Connection Postcard'.

One part includes important mental health information and Beyond Blue contact details; while the detachable second part includes a pre-paid postcard for recipients to pen a personalised note to send to a friend or loved one.

Created by regional Australian artist, Jocelyn Proust, the postcard illustration shows two fairy wrens in a vibrant natural setting to signify the power of communication for connection and begins with the words, "sharing this postcard because I care".

The postcards include three new messages to encourage connection:

**Share a thought** - Send this postcard to someone you care about. Tell them why you're thinking of them and that you're never too far away for a chat.

**Share a memory -** Sharing a cherished memory you've experienced together can help you feel closer, even if apart.

**Share a story -** Stories help us connect and understand each other better. Let them know a story from your life lately and ask for one in return.

Australia Post General Manager Community and Stakeholder Engagement, Nicky Tracey, said "Since 2020, over 16 million Connection Postcards have been delivered, providing Australians, including those in



regional and remote communities, access to Beyond Blue's incredible resources and the opportunity to connect with someone they care about. In fact, last year's Connection Postcard campaign demonstrated that 95%\*\* of recipients who sent on the postcard felt more positive," Ms Tracey said.

**Beyond Blue Chief Executive Officer Georgie Harman** 



said the expanded campaign comes at a time when greater community connection and awareness about accessible and affordable mental health supports was critical.

"While people have never been more digitally connected, the research shows too many people experience feelings of disconnection, loneliness and isolation...we hope to continue fostering genuine connection through the simple act of sending a personalised postcard, while also encouraging people to look after their mental health and know that Beyond Blue is always there for them with free support around the clock. Whether it's a simple conversation, a supportive gesture, or a shared experience, fostering connection is essential for nurturing resilience, reducing isolation, and promoting overall wellbeing."
