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

WHERE DOES ENCOURAGEMENT END AND CONTROLLING BEHAVIOUR **BEGIN IN SPORT?**

eckham, a Netflix documentary about the life of sporting legend David Beckham takes a candid look at the player's life, along with the highs and lows of being one of the most recognisable sporting Identities in the world.

Throughout the four-part series, Beckham reflects on his childhood and his father's uncompromising vision for how his young son would succeed on the world stage. In a recent *The Conversation* article, Victoria University (VU) academics Dr Mary Woessner, Dr Aurélie Pankowiak and Professor Alex Parker unpack the controlling behaviours enacted by his father, Ted.

"Throughout the documentary, Ted's behaviours are normalised and rationalised by both Ted and Beckham himself as being necessary to support David's trajectory into high performance football. David himself shared that he was scared of his father's feedback and felt compelled to practice for hours every day. Herein lies one of the most challenging aspects of dismantling controlling behaviours in and around sport: it's normalised and rationalised as necessary for success as an athlete," Dr Woessner said.

Recent data collected by the researchers shows that parents abuse against children in Australian community sport was experienced by one in three respondents.

Psychological abuse by parents had the highest frequency in respondents (30%), which includes such behaviours as excessive criticism, insults and humiliation; excessively training to extreme exhaustion/ vomiting; and ignoring a child following a sport performance.

"The biggest concern is that these negative practices in sport have been normalised for generations. This isn't about a few problematic individuals – it's about parents repeating behaviours based on their own experiences.

Change won't come quickly, but we can all contribute to solving this issue by reflecting and changing our own behaviours and focus on how we can improve the child's sporting experience", Dr Pankowiak said.



Council calls for both Federal and State Government funding support for Outdoor Pool

hilst Central Goldfields Shire Council remains committed to seeing the Maryborough Olympic Pool Complex restored and re-opened, at the May Council Meeting earlier this week, a decision was made to defer the Victorian Government funding application.

Council was recently notified that the funding application to the Federal Government's Growing Regions Fund for the Maryborough Olympic Pool Complex was unsuccessful.

Considered as an Urgent Business item at the Meeting, the Officers Report recommended that Council confirm a co-contribution to the Victorian Government's Sport and Recreation Victoria Regional Community and Sports Infrastructure Fund application through \$4 million in future borrowings.

Council decided to defer the commitment to contribute to the project through borrowings until further information and options are able to be considered.

In speaking to the motion, Councillors stated their ongoing commitment to reopening the pool complex for the community but noted the need for both state and federal funding support to achieve this.

As a result of this decision, Council will withdraw its current application to the Victorian Government's Sport and Recreation Regional Community and Sports Infrastructure Fund and consider new applications later this year when further rounds of State and Federal funding become available.

Central Goldfields Shire Maryborough Ward Cr Geoff Lovett said Council remained committed to seeing the Maryborough Olympic Pool Complex re-opened. "Like us, we know our community will be disappointed to hear that our Federal Government funding application wasn't successful.

"Last night's decision not to pursue the State Government funding application does not mean we have abandoned this project – far from it – we remain committed to see this much-loved community asset restored and re-opened.

"The reality is that due to the high cost of the project, we as a Council cannot fund this project on our own - we must get funding from both Federal and State Governments to do so.

"In the case of this project, getting funding from one level of government isn't enough – we need both levels of government to show commitment to the project."

Central Goldfields Shire Mayor Cr Liesbeth Long said she supported Geoff's concerns.

"\$4 million is a lot of money to a small rural Council—to borrow this much money would mean we would be paying this off over 15 years. This really pushes our financial limits in an already constrained financial environment.

"Put simply it would mean we wouldn't have the funding we might need to support anything else in the community.

"We know our community has many different needs and priorities and to not have the funds to support anything else would be incredibly challenging – and in a lot of ways unfair.

"What we are asking Council officers to do next is to look at other funding streams when further rounds of State and Federal funding become available later in the year.

"We will continue to advocate to Federal and State governments for the funding we need to see the Maryborough Olympic Pool Complex restored and re -opened."

Central Goldfields Mayoral Column

A week ago I had the absolute honour as Mayor and ward councillor to officially open muchneeded, fabulous new multi-use courts at Dunolly's Deledio Recreation Reserve.

Things don't get much better than this and it will be a memory I will savour and treasure for a long time.

This is because I know first-hand how much work has gone into making the end result become a reality.

Nothing starts without money and in this case, after years of tirelessly advocating, it was a Victorian Government grant of \$728K and a Central Goldfields Council co-contribution of \$243K that finally got the ball rolling in earnest.

Next up, a rock-solid partnership with Council, Dunolly Football Netball Club, the Deledio Recreation Reserve Committee of Management and the wider community. With a special shout out to Dunolly Football Netball Club Life Member Katie Lovell, who has also been the chair of the Court Upgrade Committee during the life of the project.

Then it was over to Council's Major Projects and Recreation Teams for getting the works started after a tender process, together with Quantum Civil, the builders, court designers, Idwalla, and our very own local business, Shay Excavations.

This all resulted in one netball court and one tennis/ netball/multi-use court; night lighting to expand hours-of-use; player shelter and bench seating; paths; landscaping; a drinking fountain and fencing.

To see these first-class new facilities being used and enjoyed from now on for years to come is just fantastic.

I'm super proud of the Dunolly people. You work hard and you are tireless. You all grasp the value of having a community club like this as a place where everyone can come — it's a safe place, it's a welcoming place.

Dunolly certainly has passion, and I think this is the result: that things are being built and funding is being given, because you are all working hard. It's that sort of commitment that gets you noticed and is testament that the passion you all have, which is what gets you over the line.

And yes, this project brings us another step closer to Dunolly getting the first-class Recreation Reserve facilities it desperately needs.

We are not quite there yet, but I can assure you that as with the magnificent electronic scoreboard that was opened last year, and now the new courts - the advocacy will continue!

Council are currently awaiting two live grant applications for the funding needed to see the clubrooms rebuilt — our hope is that we can make this project happen sooner rather than later.

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


BREATHING NEW LIFE IN BEALIBA

The Changing Face of volunteering Forum — A Review

ix volunteers from Dunolly ventured out into the cold, rainy weather, to attend The Changing Face of Volunteering forum last Thursday Evening. (May 30, 2024).

Organised by the Maryborough Volunteer Centre and the Central Goldfields Shire the forum provided an opportunity for volunteers from a wide variety of organisations to hear from speakers who are taking different approaches to recruiting and utilizing volunteers.

Gary Higgins, from Rotary, explained the concept of Project Based Volunteering which has already been successful in attracting volunteers to restore Bristol Hill in Maryborough.

Projects give people a specific project to volunteer for and focus on, appealing to

volunteers who may not want to sign up for ongoing commitment but can lend their skills and knowledge to achieving a specific goal.

The Dancing Doctor, Richard Mayes, arrived straight from delivering babies in the Bendigo hospital Birthing Unit just in time to deliver his address.

Richard gained the title of Dancing Doctor because he began a small dancing group for patients recovering in hospital. Richard related his experiences around improved outcomes for patients when they engage in something they enjoy in a social situation.

Richard has gone on to advocate health professionals prescribing social interaction as a recovery tool for patients.

In between the interesting speakers there was time for discussing issues concerning volunteering and what stops people from putting their hand up and getting involved. The consensus of the 80 volunteers present were the positive benefits experienced both for the volunteer and the organisation they volunteer with.

The forum was held at the very impressive Salvation Army conference room in Maryborough, and catered for by Red Cross volunteers. We are by nature social beings. Volunteering provides opportunities to contribute skills and knowledge and in return to receive valuable social contact and become a valued member of the community.

As belts tighten and people lead busy working lives volunteers have become thin on the ground but are needed more than ever in our community.

There are many organisations in Dunolly and surrounds which would welcome your contribution.



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

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Parliament Incursion at School A lesson in Civics

Mark and Vicky from the Parliament of Victoria Outreach Program visited the Dunolly Primary School to run a Civics session with the students.


