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

Regional Telco Online Review

ave your say via an online consultation by the Regional Telecommunications Independent Review Committee as its final step in receiving feedback from the public, on connectivity issues impacting them and ahead of recommendations being delivered to the Australian Government.

The Regional Telecommunications Review – held once every three years – plays a key role in reducing the digital divide between cities and regional Australia, with feedback from the public in previous Reviews leading to policy initiatives and programs such as the Mobile Black Spot Program and the National Audit of Mobile Coverage.

The Committee chaired by the Hon Alannah MacTiernan, will take the feedback from the online consultations and the feedback it has received to date, to deliver its recommendations by the end of the year, to which the Government must respond.

"We know connectivity is a major problem for many people and we would encourage communities to work together to make these online consultations as accessible as possible, whether that be visiting a friend's place, a local library, or somewhere else that has a reliable connection." Ms McTiernan said. The online consultations tie off the feedback stage

and noting time differences, the session for Eastern and Central Australia will be held on:-

Tuesday, 1 October: 9:30am - 11:00am AEST.

The views of regional, rural, and remote Australians experiencing connectivity issues have been heard loud and clear with a record-breaking number of submissions delivered through the national survey, public submissions as well as face-to-face consultations across each state.

The 2024 Review engagement has broken records, receiving more than 3,300 submissions from the public – an increase of more than 400% compared to 2021. The easily accessible online survey option, utilised for the first time in a Review, drove most of the submissions received, with a total of 3,098 responses.

Reducing the digital divide will ensure communities in rural, regional, and remote Australia reach their potential, such as improving access to online services, education opportunities, supporting local businesses, and being better able to connect with friends and loved ones.

Checking Australia's Rearview Mirror

ational insurer AAMI recently released a special *Decade of Driving Report*, as part of its Crash Index – looking back at the driving trends of the past ten years and learn how to improve road safety.

Analysing more than 4.3 million motor claims across the country from 2014 – 2023, *AAMI's Decade of Driving Report* highlights the country's most dangerous crash hotspots.

Plenty Road, Bundoora, in Melbourne's north-east, has the dishonourable title of being Australia's most dangerous crash hotspot of the past decade.

Leah James, AAMI Motor Claims Manager said,

"What we hope to achieve with our AAMI Decade of Driving Report, is to bring awareness to where, when and how accidents occur, so that Aussie drivers can be better informed and educated on how to drive more safely.

While there have been many changes, and technological advances, to the types of vehicles we drive since we started the AAMI Crash Index in 1994, the report found that we haven't changed much about the way we drive."

Key National insights:

TGI Friday?: Friday was the worst day of the week for crashes (16 %), followed by Thursday and Wednesday. Surprisingly, the weekend (Sunday then Saturday) were the days Aussies were least likely to have an accident.

Beware the afternoon slump: The worst time of day for a crash has not changed over the past 10 years – afternoons between 1:00pm and 4:30pm. Mornings between 9:30am and 1:00pm, followed by late afternoon from 4:30pm – 8:00pm are the other worst times to be on the road.

Nose-to Tail: The most common collision on Aussie roads were nose to tail crashes (26%). Over the past 10 years, drivers were also frequently failing to giveway (19%), and accidentally damaging cars while parked (17%).

Women on TOP: Male drivers (54%) were significantly more likely than females (46%) to have a crash, while older drivers aged 65+ were interestingly the most dangerous behind the wheel, with more than a quarter (26%) of claims being attributed to them.



VOTE FOR FLYNN WARD

The Central Goldfields Shire Council Elections is via postal ballot packs only. Ballot packs for your Council ward will be randomly mailed across four days from Oct 7-10



Returned Ballots must be in the post by 6 pm Friday, October 25.

As the mailout will be at random, you may not receive ballot packs for members of the same household at the same time.

If you're going to be away from your enrolled address between Monday 7 October and Friday 25 October, you may still be able to vote in your local council's election.

Ballot pack replacement

You can ask to send a replacement ballot pack to a new address (including interstate and overseas addresses) if:

- you will be away when ballot packs are mailed (from Monday 7 October)
- your address has changed since the roll closed (Wednesday 7 August).

If you have moved within or out of your council area after the roll closed, you must vote for your old address. If you fail to vote, you risk a fine. Applications open on **Tuesday 15 October**. You can also call the VEC on 131 832 before 15 October for help with your ballot pack or request a replacement vote online via the VEC website: vec.vic.gov.au

Vote in person

If you're away for the entire voting period, you can vote in person or can drop off your ballot pack at your local election office at 53 Burns Street, Maryborough but NOT your local council's offices.

Let us know you're away

If you can't redirect your ballot pack or vote at your local election office, you can let the VEC know that you're going to be away by submitting an 'Away from Victoria' form. It is not compulsory to vote if you are not in Victoria during the voting period.

This form is linked to your enrolment. Please check your enrolment first, then select 'Away from Victoria'. Keep evidence of your travel, as you may receive an 'Apparent failure to vote notice' early in 2025. This letter is your chance to explain why it appears you did not vote.

Check my enrolment | Victorian Electoral Commission (vec.vic.gov.au) Use *Check my enrolment* to check your enrolment details for Victorian state and local council elections.

You can sign up to VoterAlert, VEC's free SMS and email reminder service when you check your details. When you sign up to VoterAlert, VEC will send you reminders about elections in your area.

The Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) shares your federal enrolment details with the VEC. If you have checked your enrolment with the AEC, you don't need to verify it again. If you are a silent elector please call the enrolment helpline on 1300 805 478. Your details will not appear online.

GSG Off Grid Home Visit

Goldfields Sustainability Group (GSG) is a local group that organizes events related to sustainable living. Whilst there have been few of these recently, it is hoped to plan more in future and the first of these will be on Sunday, September 29th with a visit to an off grid home. How can a home function off-grid and blend into its bushland setting to cause minimum impact? How can planting native plants improve the land?

Goldfields Sustainability Group is arranging a site inspection of an owner-built home at Moonambel which has achieved much of this. Spring is the perfect time to visit the native garden in flower.

This garden uses no reticulated water during summer. There are fruit trees as well. The home is oriented to get the best of sunny days to help with heating during winter, tank water is mostly gravity fed and electricity is from roof top solar and batteries. Weather permitting there will be a short walk through the surrounding bushland to learn about how this is cared for as well. The visit will take place on Sunday 29th September from 2pm till 4pm.

REGISTER YOUR BURNS

As hundreds of thousands of Victorians begin preparing their property for fire season, emergency services are encouraging landowners to register any planned burn-offs online, through the Fire Permits Victoria website.

Landowners will be looking to take advantage of the spring conditions and authorities expect a surge in burn-off registrations over the coming weeks.

The quickest and easiest way to register your burn-off

is by using the Fire Permits Victoria website at www.firepermits.vic.gov.au/notify.

CFA Chief Officer Jason Heffernan said the Fire Permits Victoria website is the preferred platform for community members to register their burns.

"By registering your burn-off, it allows emergency services to verify the fire is not an emergency and avoid unnecessary call outs for local brigades. It also allows us to display burn-offs on the CFA website, preventing needless calls to Triple Zero (000)" Mr Heffernan said.

The website allows you to notify emergency services of your burn-off, and also check and apply for a permit, if necessary. However, if your burn is taking place within the next two hours, you must register your burn via the phone line on 1800 668 511.



BEFORE YOU NOTIFY US, MAKE SURE YOU:

- ⇒ Follow regulations or laws by CFA and local council.
- ⇒ Notify your neighbours if the burn will generate fire and smoke.
- ⇒ Check the weather conditions are safe to burn. Postpone your activity if high fire risk conditions develop.
- ⇒ Establish a gap in vegetation or fire break of no less than three metres cleared of all flammable material.
- ⇒ There are enough people to monitor, contain and extinguish the burn safely and effectively. Never leave a burn-off unattended.

Dunolly Museum Tour



he Dunolly Museum hosts a tour of the Goldfields region every six months hosted by John Tully who always presents a well-researched and popular event. 30 people ranging from locals to day trippers from Melbourne met at the museum on Sept. 16th and carpooled along dusty back roads around Goldsborough.

We stopped to see the remains of the old bridge built by Harry Deason, to help the school children cross the muddy area from the town to get to the local Goldsborough School house. We visited the site of the old Susso (sustainance or dole) woodcutters camp, built in the 1930's giving work to locals during the depression.

During the 1940's wartime it was turned into an internment camp for the local Italian men. Some of the tracks we drove along are deeply crevassed and need cars with a high wheelbase. I was lucky enough to carpool with Joe, our local *Welcome Record* photographer who has a four wheel drive. I doubt my little city car would have made it through the deep ruts!

We looked at Dodd's Gully with the rich gold reef and stopped at the old swamp which is now a charming dam where the local Aborigines would meet on their way to corroborees at Bealiba and Eddington. It was used for yabby fishing by the indigenous tribes.



fter lunch at the Goldsborough Reservoir, we saw the Queens Birthday Mine and were surprised to see a large flat area of bitumen which had been the 1952 Goldsborough Tennis Court. It seemed so incongruous in the abandoned gold mining area.

There was also the remains of the library and dance hall, with just the hole for a cellar remaining. It was hard to imagine that the area once had a population of 900 residents. A highlight was the charming brick Kings Birthday Powder Magazine built circa 1879. We also saw the old Eucalyptus still and wooden winch that was operated by the Martin family. We drove along Bakers lane with the house of the







Baker family who were famous photographers of the 1920's. We finished our highly enjoyable day with a stop at the site of the 1878 Railway station which closed in 1958.

The tour finished with hearty applause and gratitude to John and the Museum for this wonderful day's outing. These informative tours are a fun social outing bringing locals together to learn about our wonderful local history. Look out for the next tour which must be booked online via Humanitix.

WHAT DOES A COUNCILLOR DO?

The official line is: "The key aspects of a Councillor's role include participating in the decision-making of Council, representing the interests of the municipality and participating in strategic planning activities."

This is true, but very 'dry'. I see the role as councillor is to have the very best interests of my constituents at heart. I'm a servant leader, so for me it's always been about that. Councillors' role first and foremost is to LISTEN, because without listening, you are steering a ship without a rudder. You must know the issues and concerns, and then work to solve them through advocacy.

WHAT MADE YOU DECIDE TO RUN FOR COUNCIL?

I was born in the Netherlands. In 2019 I took a gap year to finally reconnect with my European heritage after living in Australia for 37 years. Whilst walking the 800km Camino de Santiago pilgrimage in Spain, during a 40-degree heatwave on a dusty

path to visit a church, I pondered where I belonged. The sun was relentless, bouncing off the gravel road and I'd run out of water.

Then it hit me: I am an Australian and I belong in Australia! Upon my return, I decided that if this is where I belong, I'm going to make it the best place it can be and became a councillor in 2020.

WHAT IS YOUR VISION FOR FLYNN WARD?

My vision is to see Flynn thrive, with community members fully engaged. It's a community that has regular and convenient public transport to keep people connected with friends, family, jobs, shopping and health needs. It's an environmentally sustainable community, where everyone is accepted for who they are, where people can get around, feel safe and look out for each other.

Flynn treasures its countless volunteers that tirelessly give so much, showing up time and time again, to get the job done. Above all, it's a community that values tourism and supports: local businesses, the farmers, sporting clubs, organisations, and schools.

WHAT ARE 3 KEY PRESSING ISSUES/CONCERNS FOR FLYNN? AND WHAT WILL YOU

1. Deledio's new pavilion - the current building is abysmal. Flynn needs female friendly and accessible facilities. With Council's recent \$1M grant funding for a new pavilion and committed council future borrowings, I will ensure this gets built!

2. Flynn needs better Public Transport connectivity. I've been working closely with locals to address this and have made real progress with state government MP's and Ministers to get timetabling reviewed and revised. I will continue this work - because Flynn deserves better.

3. As a farmer I know firsthand how crippling droughts can be. The Southern Wimmera & Northeast Pyrenees (SWNP) rural pipeline will provide water to farm gates where surface catchment has become unreliable. This will 'drought proof' communities, providing significant environmental, social and economic benefits. With the \$150M business case about to go to parliament, I will continue meeting with project champions GWMwater, our 2 neighbouring shires and stakeholders.
