# Paying with your face: ready or not?

re you ready to embrace facial recognition payment technology?

Imagine walking into a store, picking up your items and paying just by looking at a screen. This is already a reality in China thanks to facial recognition payment technology, but how do people on the other side of the world feel about it?

Facial recognition payments use biometric data—specifically facial features—to complete transactions. The technology captures your facial image at checkout and links it to your bank account.

For consumers, it can offer convenience and speed. However, the study suggests that widespread adoption faces significant challenges.

A study by researchers from the University of Auckland and Queensland University of Technology explores this payment method which hinges not just on the technology itself but on how well it satisfies basic human needs: competence, autonomy, and relatedness.

In other words, for people to embrace this technology, they need to feel confident in using it (competence), in control of their decision to use it (autonomy), and connected or comfortable with the idea (relatedness). In-depth interviews with 20 participants, the research discovered people's apprehension regarding overspending and compulsive shopping.



"It could be bad because then I've got no way of saying 'I don't have money on me.' That is when you always have an open purse ... Yeah, sadly, facial recognition is always there." One interviewee said.

he study also found that people are more likely to try using their face to pay if they feel it won't be a hassle, and if they haven't had previous negative experiences with similar facial recognition tech.

"Imagine you're in the supermarket looking at the screen to pay, but it's not working, it's not recognising you. So, you're moving your head from side to side, up and down. This can be really embarrassing for some people, and if it happens once, there's less interest in trying again. Some people might lose confidence in the technology *altogether* " Co-author University of Auckland Associate Professor of Marketing Laszlo Sajtos said. The study suggests that retailers need to provide support services—like having staff on hand to assist with any issues during

the initial rollout. The paper also points out that people need to feel in control. If they feel pressured to adopt this kind of payment system, they might push back. Privacy and security concerns also play a significant role, says senior lecturer Dr Shasha Wang (Queensland University of Technology). "Some people think they are ok with this technology because they have used facial recognition to unlock their phone or that their face is already on the internet, but when it comes to payments, this is totally different; this is connected to your financial information. This means that banks and retailers will have customers' faces stored in their systems and some people have concerns about this, especially with the rise of deepfakes and other scams.'

The study also highlights the importance of social influence. If friends and family are using these systems successfully, others are more likely to give it a go. Facial recognition payments have the potential to revolutionise how we pay, but for this technology to take off, Wang and Sajtos say it needs to address the real, psychological needs of its users.



#### How to vote correctly

You must complete your ballot paper correctly for your vote to count. Put the number 1 in the box next to the candidate you want to see elected, then number all the other boxes in order of your choice. You must number every box and only use each number once.






The Hollywood tycoon Cecil B. D. Mille was so pleased with his epic film *The Ten Commandments* that he hired a team of writers to come up with ten more.

# **Funding for Creative Space**

entral Goldfields Shire has welcomed the Victorian Government's announcement of \$150,000 in funding for the Creative Space, Courtyard and Co-working Space infrastructure at the iconic Maryborough Railway Station.

The funding - secured through an application to the Victorian Government's *Creative Neighbourhood Infrastructure Support Program* - will complement the \$100,000 received in June for "*Creative Station* – *Engage and Inspire*" as part of the Victorian Government's Council Support Program.

It will build on previous infrastructure upgrades at the iconic Maryborough Railway Station, and forms part of Council's Priority Project - Station Reactivation Stage 4.

The funding will deliver provision of disability access, flexible staging and seating for performances, digital projection facilities, equipment and amenities for working with wet materials, and digital creation and presentation.

Central Goldfields Shire General Manager Community Wellbeing Emma Little said the latest round of funding is part of a long-term plan the Council has been delivering for the Maryborough Railway Station.

"We know that arts and creativity are vital to not only the wellbeing of our community but also to further increasing the attractiveness of our Shire to visitors.

"With the support of the State Government, in 2023 we were able to redevelop the Visitor Centre as well as a basic upgrade of the Creative Space and



Courtyard at the northern end of the platform in readiness for this next chapter.

"The south end of the Station is really buzzing now with VLine, The Station Café Restaurant and Bar and the Visitor Centre. Our focus is now on activating the northern end of the precinct – specifically the Creative Space and Courtyard.

"This latest grant gives us the funds we need to add a range of flexible infrastructure so that a wide range of creative events, performances, workshops and other activities will be available for community and visitors, while also supporting the development of our local artists and creative industry.

"The earlier grant supports us with activation and soon we'll be appointing a project officer to engage with our community around what they want the space to be used for and to develop a model and pilot program. We look forward to seeing the north end of the Station brought to life!"

The project is expected to be completed by July 2025.

# Timely Funding For Mallee Species & Habitat

he Australian Government is investing in important new projects in the Mallee to help protect threatened species and landscapes.

These projects are part of the roll out of more than 115 specialised projects, supported by funding from the \$224.5 million Saving Native Species Program and \$1.1 billion Natural Heritage Trust.

This critical investment supports a range of landscapes, including the 20 priority places in the Threatened Species Action Plan.

They help to restore habitat, control invasive species and tackle disease in ecological communities that need it the most.

Minister for the Environment and Water, Tanya Plibersek said, "I am committed to protecting the precious habitat of Australia's threatened plants, animals and ecosystems for future generations. The priority landscapes that are receiving funding are incredibly biodiverse, with many native animals and plants calling them home. But they need our help.

The projects will mobilise the expertise of First Nations people, natural resource managers,

scientists, conservation organisations and community groups.

Senator Jana Stewart added, "I grew up in the Mallee so I know how beautiful and diverse the landscape in the region is. It is great to see this investment into supporting and protecting such a special part of Victoria.

"With this investment, we will continue to strengthen our local communities, and natural resource management capacity, and support activities and projects that help to improve the trajectory of Australia's environment."

#### The funding includes:

- $\Rightarrow$  \$2 million for Plains for Wanderers 2023-28.
- ⇒ \$2 million for Building resilient Wimmera-Mallee Malleefowl communities.
- ⇒ \$1 million for Red-tail Black-cockatoo recovery.
- ⇒ \$2 million for the Hattah Lakes Ramsar Site, securing the environmental benefits of appropriate watering regimes.



BIG GAMES call for big-game players. Kai Lohmann, Maryborough local officially joined the Big Game Player Club on Saturday with a Grand Final to remember.

The Brisbane Lions livewire kickstarted his side's premiership charge in the flag decider with its first two goals in the opening quarter. He kicked the first of a barnstorming second term. And for good measure finished with a fourth goal after a high-flying grab in the fourth quarter.

For Lohmann, who strongly considered returning to Victoria last year when clubs were chasing the out-of-contract forward and he couldn't break into the Lions' forward half, he knew things were going his way.

"I love the big moments. I just want to always play my role and not be too selfish but when I get my opportunities I want to take them with both hands. I want to keep rolling and if I'm feeling good, then the boys know I'm feeling good as well," he told AFL.com.au in Brisbane's euphoric rooms postgame.

The 21-year-old etched his name in Brisbane folklore in just his 35th game with a standout performance as the Lions trounced Sydney by 10 goals. It came after Lohmann started on the interchange before being deployed to energise the Lions' forward mix with his two first-term goals on their way to their first premiership since 2003.

"I started on the pine which I don't mind doing. I come on and make an impact. I just tried to do that as soon as I came on the ground. Cal (Ah Chee) could've had a shot so it was pretty selfless from him. Then the second one I just chucked on the left and it went through which was very good," he said.
