
From the Editor...



YOUNG MOST AT RISK OF GAMBLING

egular gamblers at the greatest risk of harm are aged between 18 and 34 years, a new study by the Australian Gambling **Research Centre at the Australian Institute** of Family Studies has revealed.

955 people who bet online at least fortnightly on sports or races, plus 1,016 people who gamble at least fortnightly on pokies, were surveyed as part of the National Gambling Trends Study.

Regular pokies gamblers in this age bracket spend an average of \$1,453 a month across all forms of gambling, including \$500 a month on the pokies. While gamblers of all ages had high levels of meeting criteria for 'at-risk gambling', it was highest for these youngest pokies gamblers at 89% indicating they spend more than they can afford, or feel guilty and stressed about their gambling, for

Of all regular pokies gamblers, their last session was about two hours (median), with 53% gambling alone. 6% reported their last session on the pokies lasted for more than 24 hours.

Meanwhile regular online bettors aged 18-34 years spent an average of \$886 a month across all forms of gambling, and 82% met the criteria for 'at-risk gambling'.

Of all regular online bettors, more than half had multiple betting accounts and 13% had used an offshore unregulated betting account during the past 12 months. 27% used credit cards to gamble, and less than 7% sought help for their gambling. Around half of regular online bettors participate at least weekly in sports and race betting (45% and 53% respectively).

Research Fellow at the Australian Gambling Research Centre, Dr Nancy Greer, said "It may be tempting to gamble at this time of year - but it's important to think it through, set limits, and be prepared to lose any money gambled. It's also worth being aware of the seductive nature of gambling. Many from this study reported the negative impacts of their regular gambling - for example, increased credit card debt, reduced savings and spending money, or feelings of regret, shame and distress. Despite this, few reported seeking help for their gambling."

AIFS Research Director Dr Rae Kaspiew said the study supports recent moves by governments at all levels to reform the gambling industry.

"The current momentum across the country to reform the gambling industry is necessary for the wellbeing of our citizens. Measures such as reducing pokies venues' operating hours, enforcing binding limits on pokies' losses, banning credit card use for online gambling, and introducing a national register for



online gamblers to voluntarily opt-out are a justified response to the prevalence of gambling at at-risk levels. We hope this latest report on the impact of gambling on regular pokies and online gamblers will inform and accelerate efforts to curb this insidious problem" Dr Kaspiew said

Across both forms of gambling – online and pokies – younger people were at the greatest risk.

This is the first release of the National Gambling Trends Study after a successful pilot and national roll-out between 2021 and 2022.

The Australian Gambling Research Centre is based at the Australian Institute of Family Studies (AIFS). AIFS conducts original research to increase understanding of Australian families and the issues that affect them; see aifs.gov.au


When we came out an hour later, the fog had cleared, the garden was normal, the pup went quickly about her business and we were back by the fire in a few minutes.



World Mental Health Day Supporting Parents Critical

Carol Markie-Dadds, Triple P International Country Director, said that the mental health of kids and young people is worsening, with around 1 in 10 children aged between 4 and 11 experiencing a mental health disorder. Half of adult mental health issues emerge before the age of 14.

"A range of ongoing societal factors are resulting in a tidal wave of mental health concerns for a significant number of our children and are also impacting parental wellbeing, relationships, and general enjoyment of life.

"Parents and carers are facing unprecedented stress off the back of rising interest rates, cost-of-living, and housing instability.

"While they may try to protect their children from these pressures, the ongoing stress inevitably affects kids.

"The impact of social media and concerns around online safety is adding another layer of worry for families. The 2024 Triple P Parenting Survey of more than 8,000 families found that nearly 8 out of 10 parents (79%) are concerned about social media's impact on their children's mental health and wellbeing." she said.

Ms Markie-Dadds also highlighted the ripple effect of poor parental wellbeing on a child's mental health and the importance of parents and carers looking after themselves and seeking help for themself or their child if needed.

"Parents and carers are critical in safeguarding children's mental health, as they are often the first to notice shifts in mood or behaviour. However, many are unsure how to respond or where to seek help. This is where evidence-based parenting support is essential for equipping parents with the skills and confidence to spot early signs of distress in their children and have open conversations about mental health," she said.

Fear-Less Triple P Online, a free support program for parents and carers of children experiencing anxiety, is one

such tool that's making a difference.

"The milestone of more than 80,000 families in Australia accessing Triple P's evidence-based program for parents and carers of children experiencing anxiety, is a sign that the online program is needed," said Carol.

"It builds parental mental health literacy, empowers parents and carers to identify issues early, seek help without stigma, and provides strategies to support children's emotional resilience."

"By prioritising wellbeing and opening up to ask for support, whether it's with a trusted friend, GP, health professional, talking to Lifeline, or getting parenting support, parents and carers can mitigate any negative or long-term impacts."

"Our children's mental health is a societal concern and a shared responsibility. Investing in their mental health and wellbeing in the early years is part of building a healthier, more resilient community," Ms Markie-Dadds concluded.

Delivery of the Triple P – Positive Parenting Program to parents and carers of children in Australia is supported by funding from the Australian Government Department of Health and Aged

Care under the Parenting Education and Support Program.

Navigating Via Dung Beetle

Beetle that pushes dung with the help of 100 billion stars unlocks the key to better navigation systems in drones and satellites.

An insect species that evolved 130 million years ago is the inspiration for a new research study to improve navigation systems in drones, robots, and orbiting satellites.

The dung beetle is the first known species to use the Milky Way at night to navigate, focusing on the constellation of stars as a reference point to roll balls of dung in a straight line away from their competitors.

Swedish researchers made this discovery in 2013 and a decade later, Australian engineers are modelling the same technique used by the dung beetle to develop an Al sensor that can accurately measure the orientation of the Milky Way in low light.

University of South Australia remote sensing engineer Professor Javaan Chahl and his team of PhD students have used computer vision to demonstrate that the large stripe of light that forms the Milky Way is not affected by motion unlike individual blur, stars.

"Nocturnal dung beetles move their head and body extensively when rolling balls of manure across a field, needing a fixed orientation point in the night sky to help them steer in a straight line. Their tiny compound eyes make it difficult to distinguish individual

stars, particularly while in motion, whereas the Milky Way is highly visible." said Prof Chahl.

In a series of experiments using a camera mounted to the roof of a vehicle, the UniSA researchers captured images of the Milky Way while the

vehicle was both stationery and moving. Using information from those images they have developed a computer vision system that reliably measures the orientation of the Milky Way, which is the first step towards building a navigation system.

Their findings have been published in the journal



Biomimetics.

Lead author UniSA PhD candidate Yiting Tao says the orientation sensor could be a backup method to stabilise satellites and help drones and robots to navigate in low light, even when there is a lot of blur caused by movement and vibration.

"For the next step I want to put the algorithm on a drone and allow it to control the aircraft in flight during the night," Tao says.

The sun helps many insects to navigate during the day, including wasps, dragonflies, honeybees, and desert ants. At night, the moon also provides a point reference nocturnal insects, but it is not always visible, hence why dung beetles and some moths use the Milky Wav for orientation. Prof Chahl says insect vision has long inspired engineers where

navigation systems are concerned.

"Insects have been solving navigational problems for millions of years, including those that even the most advanced machines struggle with. And they've done it in a tiny little package. Their brains consist of tens of thousands of neurons

compared to billions of neurons in humans, yet they still manage to find solutions from the natural world."

40% SPIKE IN PET ALLERGYS

ew data from Greencross Vets has found a significant seasonal trend in pet allergy medications with a 40% increase in the number of pets receiving allergy treatments from July through December each year.

The data also revealed that in the past 12 months, the average number of pet allergy consultations per month has increased by over 13%, compared to the previous year.

"Springtime and the warmer months bring an influx of environmental allergens that can significantly affect pets. Just like us, dogs can have pollen and grass allergies too," says Dr Michael Yazbeck, Veterinary Director, Greencross Vets.

With the demand for pet allergy medication rising sharply each year from July and continuing to peak to December, the seasonal increase is due to several factors, including:

Pollen Season: High pollen levels due to the blooming of flowers, grasses, weeds and trees. This increased pollen can trigger allergies in pets.

Increased Outdoor Activity: With the weather warming up, pets and their owners are spending more time outdoors, increasing exposure to environmental allergens such as pollen, dust and mould. These can exacerbate allergic reactions in pets.

Seasonal Changes: The change in season also brings changes in temperature and humidity, which can contribute to the growth of mould and other allergens. These can affect pets who are sensitive to these seasonal changes.

Dust Mites: Despite being a year-round concern, the impact of dust mites can be more noticeable as the weather changes. In the warmer months, dust mites can grow in indoor environments, leading to increased allergic reactions.





The rise in medication highlights the importance of proactive allergy management for pets. Dr Yazbeck suggested, "If you notice your pet is rubbing on the carpet, scooting their bottoms or licking and chewing their paws, it generally means they're itchy. Their skin may be red and inflamed or have a dry, flaky or patchy appearance. Itchy or smelly ears can be painful and recurrent ear infections are often a result of an underlying allergy. "In the early stages, a gentle medicated shampoo may soothe sensitive or irritated skin. However, if your pet continues to scratch, lick or chew excessively they may damage their delicate skin. It is not uncommon for allergy patients to get a secondary bacterial or yeast infections which may make your pet even more uncomfortable.

"We often need to prescribe medication to bring the infection under control and provide relief for their discomfort. If in doubt always speak to your local vet for the best treatment options suitable for your pet."

The warmer weather is also the perfect breeding ground for parasites such as fleas and ticks.

"Flea, tick and worm prevention should be done 12 months of the year for cats and dogs. Even if your pet is an indoor pet, they can still get fleas. Fleas can live in carpets, upholstery and other areas within the home. Flea eggs and their larvae can persist in these environments, leading to infestations even if the pet only stays indoors. "Paralysis ticks which are found on the East Coast of Australia can be bought inside in the washing, on shoes or on your clothes. Prevention is easier than treatment," says Dr Yazbeck.





Tech Talk

BE WARY OF REMOTE ACCESS

his is a quick and easy way for technicians to access your computer without having to be there physically.

Granting access from your laptop to our workstations can allow us to resolve email issues, programs malfunctioning and more.

While this is a useful and secure way to assist you it's also an easy way for scammers to gain access. Once you give someone access to your computer they are able to get into everything.

If you have passwords saved, they can access those records and get into your accounts.

DO NOT use remote access software unless you are absolutely certain of who you are allowing into your computer.

FUN FACTS TO AVOID LOSING YOUR LIFE SAVINGS!

- 1. Banks will not send you log in requests or ask for your information outside of the Official App or web page.
- 2. Microsoft will not send unsolicited email messages or make unsolicited phone calls to request personal or financial information, or to provide technical support.

If you don't make a request they will not call. This also applies to Banks and Telstra (They won't call you)

3. If a pop-up or error message appears with a phone number, don't call the number.

Error and warning messages from Microsoft never include a phone number.

WAYS TO VERIFY A SCAM:

CALL THEM – If you receive a call from someone who you believe may be trying to scam you, then contact the people they claim to be directly (Bank, Microsoft, post office, etc.) You can find contact information for these online.

DO NOT use the supplied number to call them. A quick call can verify whether or not the call has come from them as they will have records for everything.

GOOGLE THEIR NUMBER – A reverse search on google can tell you if the number calling you has been reported as a scam in the

Ask them to verify who they are

 They should have an account number, branch number or some kind of information other than your email address or phone number.

Bitcoin/ Cryptocurrency – No legitimate business will trade in cryptocurrency such as bitcoin. If it is mentioned at all, it's a scam, or iTunes or Gift Cards or Western Union.

If you think you have been scammed please feel free to reach out, we are happy to look at questionable emails and will be able to clean up your computer if a scammer has been aiven access.
