# **New Study Supports Solar**

new study has found that 2 in 3 Australian households are willing to outlay \$8000-10,000 on rooftop solar and battery systems after expecting high winter energy bills creating a potential boom in rooftop solar.

After a record 57,000 battery or energy storage systems were installed in Australian homes in 2023 – a 21% growth on 2022<sup>1</sup> and nearly 30,000 battery units were sold in the first half of 2024,<sup>2</sup> rooftop solar already accounts for 11.3 % of Australia's electricity<sup>3</sup>.

The survey involved an independent, national representative panel of 1,000 Australians commissioned by Australian renewable energy provider, Green.com.au to gauge the impact of significant energy price rises on household budgets and to understand if the financial pressure was swaying more householders to install solar power.

Green.com.au CEO and Co-founder David Green says: "It's clear that the cost of energy is impacting people and their household budgets. Solar and solar batteries are and always will be the best way to take control and have a positive impact on your usage and power bills. Increasing costs of power and decreasing pay-back periods coupled with a dynamic and evolving energy market is giving solar with batteries even more power into consumers' hands.

"In the last 12 months alone, Green.com.au has seen a 100 % increase in battery sales, and we forecast this to grow exponentially."

Almost half (49%) of respondents say they expect post-winter energy bill shock, and an additional 17% say they have already experienced post-winter energy bill shock.

On average, winter energy bills in Australia's cooler climate states on the lower east coast are \$536 higher for gas and electricity than they are in summer<sup>6</sup>.



Alarmingly, 34% of householders say gas and electricity bills are their largest expense – well above the 21% of householders citing food as the biggest cost. In NSW and Victoria, 39% and 38% of respondents (respectively) say energy bills take the largest slice of their household budget.

When considering their last energy bill, one quarter (24%) of households say they paid more than \$300 per month than the same time last year.

Householders overwhelmingly supported home solar and battery installations, with 68% saying they are willing to invest \$8,000 -10,000 if they could save \$2,000 on their annual energy bills. The greatest support was in South Australia (76%) and the ACT (74%), followed by Queensland (70%).

unday afternoon saw a very interested crowd gather for the opening of the Indigenous garden (Garinglang Gatjin Wii) created over several years at the Central Goldfields Art Gallery. Marilyne and Rick, both Dja dja Wurrung people, gave excellent talks about the creation of the garden and the work involved to promote healing of the earth which was very compacted after years of being a car park. Some of the work had been done with digging sticks to lift deeply buried friable soil towards the surface without damaging it.

Stones were hand picked from local quarries. Plants chosen are indigenous to the local area and the art work was done by Dja Dja Wurrung artists, more art work is planned. The area is currently being used by all sorts of people, even workers from the hospital work sites like to have their lunch there sometimes. It is hoped many other people will find their way there as the trees grow and their shade becomes

welcoming during the warmer months.


Completed ballots must be posted or delivered in person to the Electoral Office at 53 Burns Street, Maryborough by 6pm, Friday 25 October.

A twelve letter word, what a lovely descriptive word. Talking to my daughter recently, she was reading through children's books she uses for teaching. She explained the repetitive phrases and words that were in these books that gave enjoyment understanding of the story.

The age of pre-school children is perfect for hooking onto rhythms and repetitive story line through the story to give a 'singsong' effect.

The other descriptive part memorising the animal or noises, is mimicking the call they make. Bees - buzz, ducks - quack, dog - woof, owl - hoot hoot! A relatively large number of bird

names arise from Onomatopoeia. This term comes from the Ancient Greek for - composing or name making.

We create the sounds creatures and often use a similar sounding word from their noises. uses phonetic imitations producing words that differ by language but not by sound.



# How super works

ew research shows three quarters of Australians believe super is important to their future financial wellbeing yet public understanding of how super works to grow people's savings remains low.

The Pyxis Polling and Insights survey finds 7 in 10 Australians don't know the Super Guarantee rate and 75% could not nominate super's low tax rate, and a third check their super balance less than once a year. The power of compounding returns to grow savings inside super is also not widely understood.

Australians who feel they understand super are more likely to be engaged with their savings, be happier with their financial decisions, and strongly support the super system.

The survey of 1030 people in July found:

- Australians' satisfaction with their super fund's performance is highest amongst those who say they understand super - with 57 per cent saying they are in a good performing fund.
- Nearly 90 per cent of Australians with a good understanding of super say it makes them feel more confident about their finances compared to 60% of those who say they have an average or below average understanding of how super works.
- 29% rate their understanding of super as an 8 or more out of 10, with most Australians say they have a moderate understanding with 53 % giving ratings between 5 and 7.

The Super Members Council has launched a new public awareness initiative, 'How Super Works' to help ensure Australians understand the powerful benefits of super. Featuring everyday Australians having conversations about super, the initiative delivers accessible messages, facts and data about super and how it works.

Super Members Council CEO Misha Schubert said the awareness initiative aimed to demystify super and put more Australians in the best position to maximise their superannuation.

"Nearly three-quarters of workers today weren't in the workforce when super was legislated 32 years ago — so it is timely to help more Australians understand how this system works for them. The more you know about super, and the more engaged you are with your super, the better you can make super work for you. Because super works automatically to help people build lifetime savings to deliver them income in retirement, it can be out of sight and out of mind for many, especially for younger people. Understanding the basics of how super works strengthens people's engagement with super and helps Australians get the most out of our country's world-class super system." she added.

And while trust in super is high, there is a need to strengthen Australians' knowledge of the system. The Pyxis Polling and Insights survey for the Super Members Council found:

- Around one in three Australians correctly nominate the current Super Guarantee rate of 11.5%, with just under half (48%) within 0.5% of the correct answer.
- Three quarters of Australians don't know that super contributions are taxed at just 15%.
- Only four in 10 Australians know that retirement balances are usually mostly made up of compound returns from investments and not the super contributions made into our super.
- Two in 10 Australians incorrectly believe that having any money in super at retirement makes you ineligible for the age pension.







# **COLLECTING FIRE WOOD**

You can only collect firewood from designated collection areas in state forests during the autumn and spring domestic firewood collection seasons.

Before heading out, find your nearest collection area online via the Forest Fire Management Victoria website or ask for a current firewood collection area map from your nearest DEECA office. When you're in the forest, look for the 'Domestic Firewood Collection Area' signposts.

Please note, that firewood collection in some areas is restricted to Local Government Area residents only. Other areas:

Firewood collection from roadsides is generally prohibited but may be allowed with a permit on select local government roads.

Parks Victoria does not allow firewood collection in the protected areas they manage, including national, state, regional and metropolitan parks.

Note: It is always illegal to cut down standing trees without express permission.

## WHEN:

You can collect firewood during the two collection seasons:

Autumn season: 1 March to 30 June
Spring season: 1 September to 30 November

These periods are chosen to avoid collection during summer when fire danger is high and winter when roads and tracks are most likely to be damaged. Collection seasons are also subject to local conditions and areas may be closed at short notice. Check online via the Forest Fire Management Victoria website for updates.

### **WHAT:**

In designated firewood collection areas, you can collect wood from trees and branches that:

- are already on the ground,
- are further than 20 metres from a waterway or waterhole (like a bog or dam),
- are not visibly hollow, and
- do not have moss or fungi growing on them.

It is illegal to chop down trees or branches if they're still standing, whether they are dead or alive.

These rules protect habitat for our wildlife and protect forest health.

### **HOW MUCH**

You can collect two cubic metres of firewood per person per day. The limit for each household is 16 cubic metres per financial year.

A single cubic metre of split firewood will fit into a standard trailer of about 1.8 metres by 1.2 metres if it's neatly stacked to a height of 50cm.

Some households in regional areas rely on firewood for winter energy. Financial assistance is available for people on low incomes who need to buy firewood. For more information visit the Forest Fire Management Victoria website.

# We'd move if we could ...

study by the University of South Australia found 53% of people living in large cities (population of more than 100,000) would be willing to move to a mid-sized city (population under 100,000) for better housing and family life.

This would be equivalent to someone relocating from Melbourne to Albury or from Adelaide to Mt Gambier.

Researchers surveyed more than 3,000 people from across Australia in 2021 – at the peak of the COVID-19 pandemic – on where they live and the factors that would shape their decision to relocate, including employment, housing and social connectedness. Results revealed that 84% of respondents were living in large cities and more than 50% would be willing to relocate somewhere smaller. Of these, 21% had a strong desire to move but the lack of job opportunities in mid-sized cities was cited as a major barrier.

Lead researcher Associate Professor Akshay Vij said "This indicates that most residents would prefer to

live in smaller urban centres but are concerned about economic opportunities and the inadequacy of services in those areas,.

"We need to alleviate pressure on the larger metropolitan areas. The strain on our big cities is reflected by the current expensive housing market, the rising level of housing unaffordability, growing traffic congestion and overcrowded schools and hospitals.

"The primary barrier to regional migration is the absence of appropriate employment opportunities. While job vacancy numbers have been persistently high in regional Australia, these are typically not the kinds of high-skill high-wage jobs that can help attract residents from large metropolitan centres" he concluded.

For the first time since 1981, Australia's regional population grew more than the capital cities during 2020-21. However, the Australian Bureau of Statistics indicated recently that here has since been a return to pre-pandemic population trends.




